The Price of Potatoes.

The other day we saw good potatoes selling at \$4 a barrel on the South Coast, while in St. John's we note they are quoted from \$11 to \$12, and on this Coast the local grown are selling at from \$5 to \$8 a barrel. Does the cost of production vary to such an extent or is it but a more bountiful crop of profiteering in some quarters. We can quite understand the price for pure bred or specially treated seed potatoes going into the two figures, but surely potatoes grown in this country for table use can be sold at as low a price as the imported article upon which duty and freight have been paid. And likewise Halifax jobbers should be able to sell as cheaply as our people who purchased in the same market and have been to corresponding expense and risk.

She had on board 120 passengers to land here and 62 for New York, for which port she sailed late last night.

Captain Mitchell reported a good trip from St. John's and that off the Newfoundland Coast between St. John's and Cape Race many large icebergs were seen, one being right in the Rosalind's path.—Halifax Morning Chronicle, May 18.

S.S. Diana which arrived at Curling from Lunenburg this morning, sailed north at 11.40 a.m. to-day.

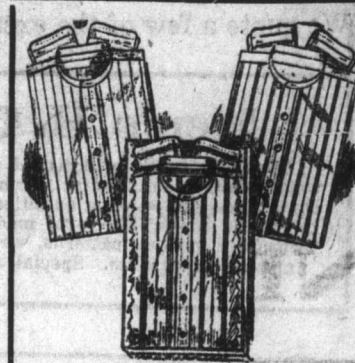
