

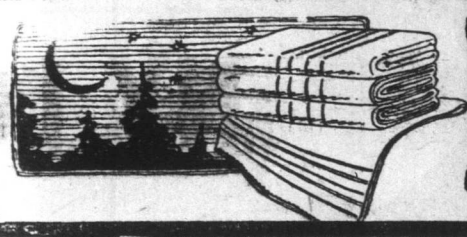

### Fined for Breach of Customs Act.

Yesterday afternoon the Captain of the schooner Arthur D. Storey was again before the Magistrate on three charges preferred by the Customs authorities. He had been fined \$200 on Monday for a violation of the Prohibition Act. The charges against him yesterday were first, having entered Bay Bulls from St. Pierre on Oct. 9th and not reporting; secondly, having entered at the port of St. John's on Oct. 13th and again not reporting, and thirdly for trying to smuggle into the colony liquor and tobacco with the intention of defrauding the Customs. Mr. Higgins, K.C., appeared for the accused and Mr. H. A. Winter for the prosecution. The hearing occupied the attention of the court all the afternoon. Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, Collector of Customs, and Mr. Jas. Wheeler of the Customs day boat, were called as witnesses for the prosecution and were examined by Mr. Winter and cross-examined by Mr. Higgins. Capt. Sturge was the only witness called for the defense and he pleaded guilty to the charge of entering Bay Bulls and not reporting. To the charge of having entered St. John's without reporting the captain swore that he did go to the Custom House and not being conversant with the rules and regulations, he asked Mr. LeMessurier to report his entry, but as his ship had already been searched by the police and the liquor found. Mr. LeMessurier directed him to the Inspector General. Regarding the third charge, he had already been fined \$200 for having the liquor on board his vessel and the 9 lbs. of tobacco which were found was for the crew's use. Judge Morris, after listening to the evidence of both sides and hearing the plea of both lawyers, took into consideration the different aspects of the case and fined the defendant \$25.00 for a breach of the Customs' Act in not reporting his vessel on arriving from a foreign port.

### Drowning Accident at Carmanville.

It is learned from passengers who arrived by S.S. Susu yesterday morning that a drowning accident, in which a young man named Elliot Hicks was the victim, occurred at Carmanville on Saturday last. It seems that in the gale of Friday last Hicks' schr. got her moorings tangled up, and whilst endeavouring to clear them the boat in which he was working was upset and before aid reached him the lad had gone under. Deceased was a son of Mr. Ezekiel Hicks and his untimely end has caused deep sorrow to his relatives and friends in Carmanville.

### Time and Talents.

An Important Meeting. ### Lost Chain and Anchor.

Yesterday morning the S.S. West Waunck, which is here with oil fuel for the S.S. Yellowstone, lost about 30 fathoms of chain with anchor attached, the mishap being caused by the anchor shackle on the port side giving way. Diver Taylor was engaged yesterday evening and succeeded in locating the ground gear.

### Personal.

Schr. Woween sailed yesterday evening for Barbados, with codfish from A. S. Rendell & Co. S.S. Rosalind is due this evening from Halifax. She will berth at Shea & Co's wharf.

S.S. Neptune sailed yesterday evening for the Labrador to bring up some of the fishing crews that are now on the coast.

S.S. Sagaland, which put into port last week in a disabled condition, has had repairs effected and continued her voyage yesterday evening.

Danish barque Clit and the S.S. Lake Furnas will go on dry dock to-day, the former to have repairs made to the hull, and the latter to have three blades put on her propeller.

S.S. Digby sailed yesterday evening at 3 o'clock for Liverpool.

Schr. Giant King is now at A. E. Hickman & Co's wharf, where she loads codfish and herring for Barbados. S.S. Noscopie is berthed at the Furness Withy Co's wharf where she is discharging her cargo of furs, etc. The Noscopie has one of the most valuable cargoes that has entered this port for some time.

### Drifters Went Down in Gale.

Crews Rescued and Brought to Halifax.

Halifax, Oct. 15.—Old ocean has wrought havoc in the latest flotilla of trawlers and drifters, formerly units of the Canadian Navy's mosquito fleet operating off these shores during the war, to sail from Halifax for the British Isles. On Sunday last two trawlers and three drifters sailed for Inverness, Scotland, there to be commissioned for sale to the British fishing industry. On Wednesday one of the trawlers returned to Halifax reporting the loss of the Cape Breton coast of two of the drifters, the crews of which were saved. The other trawler was last seen heading for Sydney with the third drifter in tow. It is presumed that she arrived there safely. On board the T.R. 54, the trawler which returned to Halifax, were the crews of the two lost drifters. They had a narrow escape from going down with their boats, one crew being rescued as their ship's decks were awash. The drifter sank a few minutes later.

### Seas Swept Deck.

"We steamed out Halifax Harbor on Sunday," said M. C. Connolly, of the crew of the T.R. 54, to a Morning Chronicle reporter yesterday. "Besides our boat there was the T.R. 25, and three drifters, Nos. 86, 87 and 15. We were not long out when the wind freshened considerably and by Sunday night it was blowing a whole gale. The little drifters were having a hard time of it, and that night we took No. 87 in tow. She was making little or no progress, and our skipper thought it best to get a line aboard her. It was a very rough night and we had no picnic aboard our own craft. T.R. 54 was bucking the gale in great style, but the seas frequently washed her and we lost almost all our deckload of coal, besides having the steering gear boxing carried away. Next morning at daybreak No. 87 signalled for her crew to be taken off. The drifter had been taking in seas now and then through the night, and towards morning suddenly began to fill rapidly. The water was above the fire, in the engine room when they asked for help from us."

### Look On Crew.

"Neither the trawlers nor drifters are fitted with davits and they carried their lifeboats on deck. It was impossible in that sea to launch the boats, so Capt. Mutch, our skipper, put his ship alongside the sinking drifter and, after some skilful manoeuvring, took off the eight men that were aboard her." On account of the rough weather and thick haze the drifter was not actually seen to sink, but those on the T.R. 54 say that she was very low in the water when last seen; that the seas swamping over her, and that she could not have remained afloat for more than five or ten minutes after they took off the crew. All that day the little fleet—or what was left of it—hammered its way against the storm. T.R. 54 took Drifter No. 87 in tow, and the T.R. 25, Capt. Robinson, put a line on Drifter No. 15. That evening, when the flotilla was about fifty miles off Canso, these last two boats were seen heading in the direction of Sydney. They signalled that everything was "O.K."

### Helpless in Seas.

T.R. 54 kept the helpless 87 up against the seas all through the night, but on Tuesday morning, the drifter was about to go under, and the trawler, with considerable difficulty, took off her crew, running alongside the sinking craft. The drifter's decks were awash when the crew of eight left her. She was not seen to sink, the two boats separating too quickly, and the weather was thick, but there is little doubt that she went to the bottom almost immediately after that. On board the T.R. 54 there were now 26 men. She was provisioned for only ten, so her skipper decided to put back to Halifax to land the two crews and report to the dockyard. It is expected that the T.R. 54 will sail from Halifax on Monday next for Inverness, probably calling en route at Fayal, the Azores, to call for one of the drifters left there by a previous flotilla from Halifax for the United Kingdom. The T.R. 54 and the drifters which were lost were units of the fleet which was anchored for some time in the Northwest Arm and later in the Bedford Basin.
