Household Notes.

Delicious sandwich mixtures can be made with odds and ends of meat. Try shirring eggs in a layer of hot hominy. Serve with cheese sauce. For making hot or cold chocolate, keep a chocolate syrup on hand. To test wool for shine, rub hard

with a piece of similar woolen goods. Minced onion and minced parsley may be added to cream of potato soup. In using stale breadcrumbs to make meat pates, soak crumbs in milk first. Cream of tartar dissolved in boiling water is excellent for grass stains. If fudge is beaten with a Dover egg beater it will be delightfully creamy.

Engine Testing by Piano.

Have you heard of the novel way in which locomotives are tested in the United States?

"Not at all," replied the foreman. "That piano is for testing the engines."

The Englishman thought it a joke, but when a uniformed pianist struck a note which harmonised with the noise of vibration in each part of the locomotive, as it was tested, he understood that there could be no flaws or cracks in the engine.

He was informed that if the noise of the locomotive made a discord with the musical note the locomotive would be proved defective. The method has been discovered to be more accurate than the old way of hammering each part.
