The adjourned meeting of the Council was held on Saturday afternoon, the full Board being in attendance.

Complaint made by F. Cornick re conditions near his dwelling Circular Road, was ordered attended to. Applications were received from the following: D. E. Pelley, for street line, Pleasant St.; J. McGrath, for permission to extend dwelling, William Street; Dr. A. Campbell for street line, Scanlon's Lane—all of which were granted, subject to the approval of the City Engineer.

Applications of A. Cranford and G. Thistle, Southside, for permission to repair galleries; also asking that attention be given drain in the locality, were referred to the City Engineer.

The readjustment of City lighting which has been receiving consideration for some time past, was taken up, and it was unanimously decided to enter into a contract with the Reid Nid. Co. for lighting of the city for a term of years, at a reduced rate, and that said contract contain a proviso, whereby same may be revised at the end of every five years. F. J. Rott &amp; Co. offered their services as arbitrators. Their communication was ordered filed.

Notable in North Country history, this battle was fought near Hexham on May 15, 1464, between the adherents of the houses of York and Lancaster, rivals for the throne of England during the Wars of the Roses. The main part of the conflict took place from the vale of Devilswater to the town of Hexham. The star of the House of Lancaster was on the wane, yet Margaret of Anjou, the heroic Queen of Henry VI, continued to make every effort to win back the crown for her deposed husband. She enlisted the sympathy of her countrymen, and a force of two thousand Normans came to her assistance. These, with her English supporters, including many North Country noblemen and gentry, were under the command of the Earl of Somerset, whilst the Yorkists, who were vastly more numerous, were led by Lord Montagu. The forces of the Queen offered a stout resistance, but were borne down by weight of numbers, and victory declared for the House of York. The Earl of Somerset was taken prisoner, and beheaded at Hexham, and several others of his party met the same fate on the Sand-

hill at Newcastle. Many of the Lancastrians who escaped, were doomed for years to lead more miserable lives. Humphrey Neville spent five years in caves and woods on the Derwent before his capture and execution, and the Duke of Exeter became an exile in Burgundy, where he was obliged to beg from door to door. King Henry himself took refuge in Lancashire, after being in hiding for twelve months, he was betrayed into the hands of his enemies. After the battle the Queen Margaret and her young son, Prince Edward, with only one attendant, named De Bridge, fled for safety to the thick wood which clothed

the side of the ravine named De Dene, now Dipton. Here, it is said, the Queen, whilst wandering with her boy one night, was confronted by a robber, who demanded her money and jewels. Undismayed by this repulse and the loneliness of the situation, the Queen replied: "I am the Queen of England, and to you I commit the safety of the King's son." The robber, who had been secretly in league with the Duke of Burgundy, accepted the trust reposed in him, conducted her and the boy to a customed dwelling, a cavern in the side of the rocky dell. Here, the royal fugitives were secretly held for several days, until a plan was devised for their escape into Scotland.
