Western Canada Storm Swept.

Death, Destruction and Disaster Caused by Cyclone—Feeling Running High in Belfast—Alleged Murderers of Wilson Arraigned—Griffith Condemns Dastardly Crime.

MANITOBA STORM.

WINNIPEG, June 23. Manitoba tonight is recovering from the effects of the most destructive storm of years, which between three and four o'clock this morning swept down from Saskatchewan by way of Brandon, Portage La Prairie, Winnipeg and Lyndall to the Ontario boundary, leaving a trail of three dead and many injured, and a property loss which will run into hundreds of thousands of dollars.

WINNIPEG STORM SWEPT.

WINNIPEG, June 23. A boy was killed here this morning when he grasped a live wire which had been blown to the ground during the storm. Another lad was killed by the falling wall of a residence. Four persons are in hospital with injuries received in various ways during the general wrecking operations of the cyclonic winds. Many chimneys were demolished, trees were uprooted and billboards blown down. The damage to this city alone is many thousands of dollars.

ANXIETY IN BELFAST.

BELFAST, June 23. The situation here to-day is one of great anxiety owing to the high state of feeling over the assassination of Marshal Wilson. Military and police were forced to fire on mobs several times.

CRIMINALS ARRAIGNED.

LONDON, June 23. Fifteen men and one woman were arrested in raids here last night in connection with the assassination of Marshal Wilson. Ansten Chamberlain informed the Commons this morning. He stated that every possible step was being taken for the protection of life in England and Ireland, and intimated that discussion of Irish affairs would be held on Monday. James MacBrien and James Connolly were arraigned to-day on the charge of murdering Wilson and the attempted murder of Constables March and Sayer, and chauffeur Alexander Clark. They were remanded for a week.

REPUBLICANS NOT RESPONSIBLE.
DUBLIN, June 23. The shooting of Sir Henry Wilson was not one at Republic instance or at that of the Irish Republican Army. If it were so the Irish Republican Army would acknowledge the fact, says a statement issued by the publicity department of the disident army at Four Courts Headquarters early this morning. "The death of Wilson is to be deplored," the statement continues to part, "not apparently at the hands of Irishmen but because he was a victim of the Imperial policy pursued by the British Government in Ireland. It would be hypocritical to condemn such actions as the shooting of Wilson while the causes that provoke such deeds remain."

CONDEMNNS CRIME.

DUBLIN, June 23. Arthur Griffith, President of the Dail Eireann, speaking last night of the London tragedy, said "Whether the assassination of Sir Henry Wilson was an act of private vengeance, or had a pseudo-political aspect I do not know, but it is a fundamental principle of civilized government that assassination of a political opponent cannot be justified or condoned. Sir Henry's political views were opposed to the vast majority of his countrymen nevertheless. I know that the vast majority will be unanimous in condemning and deploring this deed."

WILSON'S MURDER.

BELFAST, June 23. Cries of shame met the announcement by Premier Craig in the Ulster Parliament of the Death of Field Marshal Wilson. Craig said Wilson died for Ulster and his assassination showed the existence of widespread conspiracy against those fighting for Ulster.
WILL BE PROSECUTED.
WASHINGTON, June 23. Those responsible for the Southern Illinois mining disorders will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law, Secretary of Labor David declared to-day, after consulting with President Harding.

ILLINOIS MURDERS.

HERRIN, Ill., June 23. Herrin to-day remained quiet after the wild disorders of yesterday in which at least 27 men were killed and an unknown number wounded, when 5,000 Union miners and sympathizers attacked the steamshovel men and labourers working in the Lester Strip Pit. Miners here openly boasted that they participated in the shooting, hanging and dragging through the streets of victims in a veritable Roman holiday.

JAPS WILL EVACUATE SIBERIA.

TOKIO, June 23. The Japanese cabinet to-day decided that Japan shall evacuate Siberia, according to reports carried by Japanese news agencies. The decision has been referred to the Imperial Diplomatic Council.

JAPAN APPROVES.

TOKIO, June 23. The Japanese Treaty with the United States has been approved by the Japanese Council.

PORT ARTHUR, June 23. National Council of Women Convention will establish a Canadian Scholarship in Art with a years study abroad at affiliated organizations approve.

THE S.A. PEERAGE.

LONDON, June 23. The House of Lords, yesterday cheered speakers who denounced the recent offer of a peerage to South Africans. No motion however, was presented, the Lord's adjourning on the announcement of the murder of Field Marshal Wilson.

Municipal Council

HOLDS WEEKLY MEETING.
The weekly meeting of the Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and Councillors Martin, Outerbridge, Vinicombe, Ryan, and Dowden were present.

After the preliminary business of the meeting was disposed of, the following matters received attention:—
The Inspector General stated he had no objection to granting of permit to Jos. McKilney for the installation of "Bowser" gasoline tank on his premises, Lime Street.
Communications were tabled from the Newfoundland Motor Association as follows:—
(1) That they strongly endorsed the suggestions of the Inspector General as to placing of sidewalks LeMarchant Road in proper condition for pedestrian traffic.
(2) That unless Main, Palk's Hill, narrows the road at this junction and that they recommended attention be given the matter. The City Engineer was instructed accordingly.
(3) That in the matter of oiling streets, public notice be given of the streets to be treated, and recommending that when one side of the street is being oiled arrangements be made for pedestrian and vehicular traffic to use the other.
(4) Extending to the Council the congratulations of the Association on the excellent road improvement to LeMarchant Road West, recently completed under the supervision of Road Inspector Neville.
A. H. Murray and Co. called attention to the W.C. under course of erection at Beck's Cove, and stated they were of opinion the close proximity of same to the surrounding buildings was undesirable. A committee was appointed to report on the matter.
The residents of Livingstone Street complained of the inconvenience to which they were subjected through surface drainage from Tessier Place. The Engineer was instructed to report.

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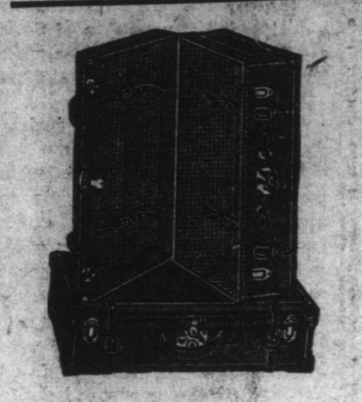

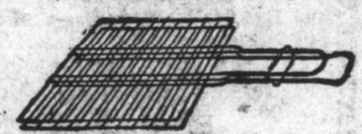
