A STRIKE Of no less than 40,000 cotton hands is expected in the Ashton-under-Lyne District, England, in consequence of a demand for an increase of fifteen per cent. in wages, which the employers refuse to grant. It is not improbable that, if the strike occurs, it will extend through the entire cotton manufacturing region. It is claimed that an advance of wages is a simple impossibility, as manufacturers' profits have been reduced so much by the high price of the raw material, and of coals, that some of the more sagacious men in the trade have advocated a temporary cessation of production, as a means of relief from the present unprofitable, and even losing, condition of the market.
