CANADA WILL MISS ONE OF THE BENEFITS OF RECIPROCITY

Paper Duty Which Is Imposed by Canada Will Be Cause of Non-Removal of Export Duty

Washington, June 15.—Amending the section of the Underwood tariff bill, which would place on the free list all print paper valued at not more than 3-4 cents a pound, the majority members of the senate finance committee today voted to incorporate in the bill the provisions of the Canadian reciprocity bill passed in 1911.

This action would extend the free list to include all print paper valued at not more than four cents a pound on the condition "that no export duty, export license fee or other export charge of any kind whatsoever, or any prohibition or restriction in any way, or the exportation shall have been imposed upon such paper, board or wood pulp of the wood pulp used in the manufacture of such paper or wood pulp."

Although the word "Canada" is omitted from the amendment adopted by the committee, it would operate against Canada because of that nation's restrictions on exports of wood and chemical pulp. Senator Simmons, chairman of the finance committee, said that other restrictive provisions or countervailing duties aimed against Canada, which would have been proposed, have not yet been acted upon by the majority, and that the matter would be taken up again. He said that the committee would be reconsidered of the action thus far taken.

Under the reciprocity amendment, pulp wood or paper could come in free from Canada when it is the product of free lands in Canada and is not restricted by export duty or license fee. Senator Simmons stated he believed the committee would consider its work by next Wednesday, and the Democratic caucus could then be called to meet immediately. The bill, he thought, would be reported to the senate the following Wednesday, June 25.

FIFTY NEW ONTARIO HOMES ARE DESTROYED

Cobalt, Ont., June 14.—Nearly fifty settlers in the townships of Tudhope, Trux, Bonhill and Back, in the immediate vicinity of the town of Charlton, lost their homes and all their belongings in a bush fire which swept through the townships Wednesday and Thursday. The settlers, with their families, fled from their homes and no fatalities have occurred.

Not since the Peaseburn fire of 1911 has such a fire swept the north country. Not only Charlton is affected but practically every other township in the district where slashings have been made. In addition to the farmers' homes, which were destroyed, many sawmills also have fallen, and lumber camps wiped out. Twelve miles in length was covered by the fire in the Long Lake section. The large saw and planing mill of the Northern Ontario Lumber company, which stood on the shores of Long Lake, was destroyed by fires late Wednesday evening.

FOY FOR JOY AND HIS SEVEN LITTLE FOYS AT GRAND TONIGHT

Great Comedian Reaches Calgary for the First Time, and Will Give as Many Laughs as Possible During His All-too-Brief Stay in the City

California Frank, as he was known, then all over the western country, left the sheriff's office when the Spanish-American war broke out and joined the army. After the war he launched into the show business, where he has been ever since and is now at the head of the best wild west show on the road, having the best people and horses carried by any tented organization on the road.

Miss Mamie Francis is the title show with the show, doing almost unheard of feats with the rifle, holding same in all different positions and shoots as well with the left hand as with the right. Is one of the few people in the world shooting objects thrown in the air while riding upon the back of a running horse. TWO-VOICED WESTERN GIRL WILL GIVE CONCERT HERE

Miss Dorothy Toye Sings From the Great Operas in Sweet Tenor and Clear Soprano

Negotiations have been concluded for the appearance in Calgary of Miss Dorothy Toye, the girl with two grand opera voices, who is making a concert tour from Winnipeg to Vancouver and Victoria.

Miss Toye is a Canadian girl who has been in Europe the last four years studying under the best masters and has surmounted the numerous obstacles in the path on the way to success. She has a phenomenal voice in that singing tenor with the full rich round quality of the male voice is absolutely no effort and in the way she sings the beauty of her pure and brilliant high soprano which is of seemingly endless range.

Musical critics in France and Germany who might be expected to look askance at the unusual combination of voices have received Miss Toye with open arms for her artistry, phrasing, interpretation, and beauty of tone in either voice. 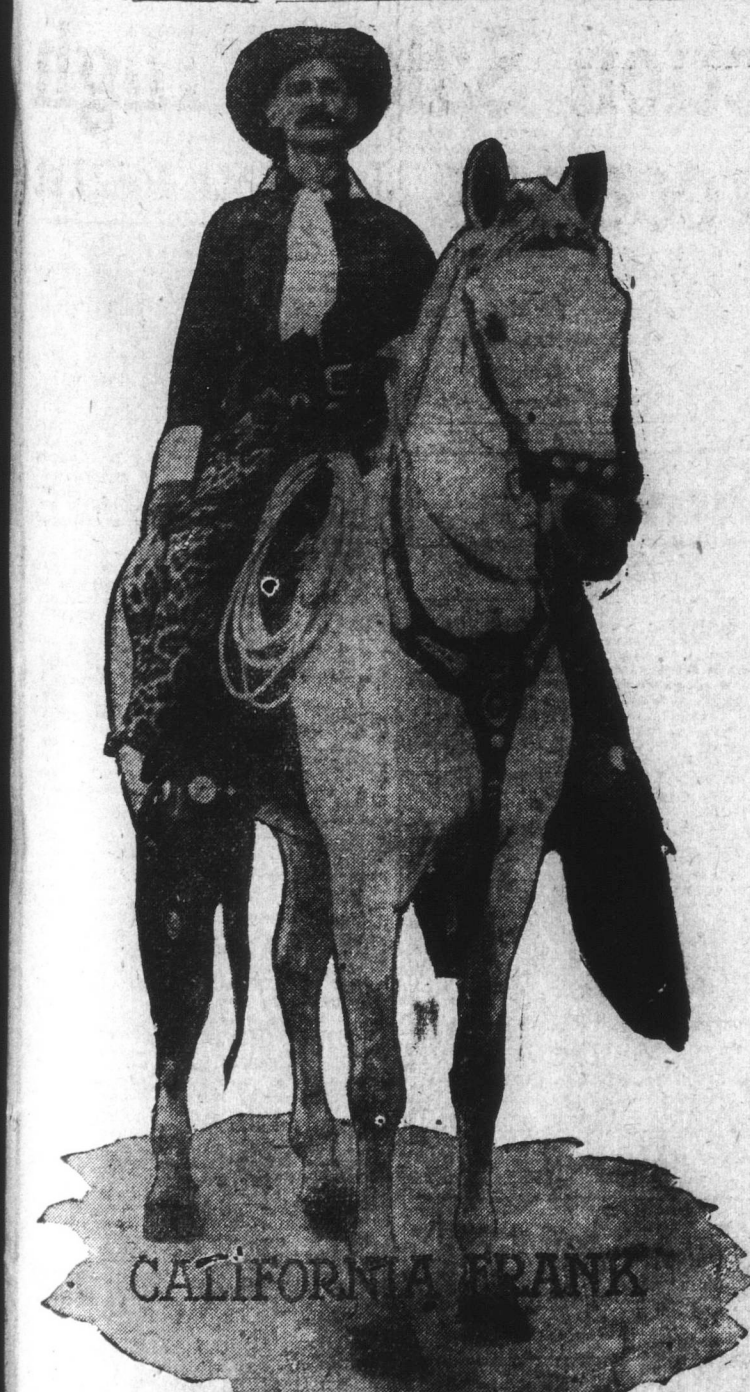
