Most of the larger cities gave majorities for light beer and the bottle goods under Government control, but the towns and rural communities easily wiped out their advantage, and the official vote is obtainable it will be found that there is a big majority for prohibition on all four questions. This should be and is cause for rejoicing and satisfaction to the people of Ontario. To the women voters must be given a large share of the credit for this splendid result. They worked unceasingly and with great effect throughout the campaign.

Miss Olive Nesbitt is home for the week-end. Miss Nesbitt has a good position in London.

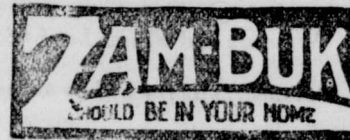
