## "LET'S WIN THE PEACE"

"Keep the Hun Where he Belongs in the Fatherland."—Writes a Returned Soldier.

After arriving home and meeting those whom I used to know, and hearing of those who are gone, victims of both war and "flu," I feel very thankful to a grateful God that I have been spared to see these people of Aylmer and surrounding country again. Most of the boys who went overseas have been through many hardships, but all, I am sure, will agree that it was worth our sacrifice to know that we helped to win the victory on the field. It is now the duty of all of us to see that we win the peace. Never did a torn world want a peace and a lasting one such as this world needs to-day. The Germans cannot be trusted, not even enough for us to have the least dealings with them. Summing them up they are "as sly as the fox" and "have the sting of the cobra." They make statements even to-day that they were not whipped on the field. Still they had a navy, second only to the Great British navy, and the best part of that fleet is now in British keeping. The morale of their armies was at the breaking point and to save that army they called for mercy, which resulted in the armistice. Now watch them in the making of the peace. They cry to-day; to-morrow as arrogant and boastful as ever, and if we give them one single consideration, they will demand two or perhaps three. There seems to be but one course to pursue, our delegates must make the terms imposed, as stiff as possible, they let the Huns attach their signatures, and it is the desire of everyone of the civilized world to see that they pay every nickel. They deserve no pity, they deserve nothing from us until they can show us, or our children that they can live with the rest of the Christian world as decent people.

We have but fifty thousand of our Canadian boys in France, the best of our country, and if we do not see that we win the peace "then we are all doing the greatest injustice to our boys that history has ever known." Let us all then join in showing the Hun where he belongs. We have won the war, let us win the peace. Many people have the opinion we should hear none of that, it is only German propaganda at work, even now. They were not lenient with our prisoners, they would not have been easy with us if they had won. So do away with all sympathy for them, give them all that is coming to them and add a little more for good measure.

Let us all work with only one end in view, that of keeping the Huns "where they have always said they wished to be, with the Fatherland." Then the world will be safe for free people to live.
