The test of the new wells recently sunk by the town, near the waterworks, commenced on Monday last and the new pump has been running since then constantly, day and night. From present appearances the supply of water would appear to be sufficient for the needs of the town, as they have from the one well been pumping about 5,000 barrels a day of 24 hours. Both wells have been lowered somewhat, but the stream struck seems to be a good one. The quality of the water has been pronounced first-class by the Government analyst, and the slight smell of chloric gas passes away when the water is exposed for a time to the air. The pump will be kept going for another week, and if the supply still holds out then the council will no doubt submit a by-law to raise money for the purpose of extending our present system of waterworks.

We understand that the parties in the interests of a Co-operative pork packing establishment, to be started in Brantford, are canvassing the farmers of this section for stock, and are meeting with considerable success. While it is none of our funeral we would advise farmers to be careful what agreement they enter into. It is just possible that the leading men in the enterprise are as anxious about themselves, as they are of the farmers, who live fifty or sixty miles away. So far as we know their scheme and plan is perfectly legitimate and honest, but it is a bad plan to fall in with every legitimate and honest proposition, especially when it is to be worked so far away from home, and in which your interests are so small and insignificant as to not cut the slightest figure, no matter what your opinion may be.

A SUCCESSFUL TOUR.
