Both wells have been lowered somewhat, but the stream struck seems to be a good one. The qualic of the water has been pronounced first-class by the Government analyst, and the slight smell of chloric gas passes away when the water is exposed for a time to the air. The pump will be kept going for another week, and if the supply still holds out then the council will no doubt submit a by-law to raise money for the purpose of extending our present system of waterworks.
