GLENCOE AND VICINITY.

Mr. J. Huston talks of establishing a wood and coal yard in town.

A gold watch and \$12 were stolen from a Parkhill resident the other day.

Alvinston's rate is 18 mills on the dollar, 2 mills less than last year.

The Glencoe semi-annual live stock fair will be held Wednesday, November 9th.

Miss McTaggart, of Ekfrid, lost a gold locket on the fair grounds at Wallace town on the 6th inst.

Mr. James A. McLean has been engaged to teach in S. S. No. 3, Ekfrid, at an increased salary.

Thieves raided the apiary of Joseph Milton, of Thames River, the other night and carried off the contents of four or five hives.

A complimentary banquet was tendered Mr. A. M. McEvoy, the new County Treasurer, at Mount Brydges, on Friday night.

Mr. Hugh Johnson, of Aldborough, fell out of an apple tree one day last week and dislocated his shoulder joint, besides receiving other injuries.

There is some talk of holding the West Elgin Fair at Dutton next year. Dutton is certainly more convenient than Wallace town to those who go by rail.

The death is announced of Mr. Robert Webster, brother of Rev. Dr. Webster, of Newbury, which occurred at his residence, 3rd con., London Township.

The bustle must go—Such is the edict set forth by the Salvation Army in Dunnville. One of the sisters was recently expelled for noncompliance with the order.

Edward Graham, who, on the 12th of August last, threw vitrol in the face of Louis Silvert, of Toronto, was sentenced by the Police Magistrate to imprisonment for life.

Mrs. John Carruthers, of the 2nd con., Mosa, was seriously injured a few days ago by her horse taking fright and running away. She now suffers from several scalp wounds.

The new frame house of Neil McCallum, lot 12, range 4, Ekfrid, was destroyed by fire the other night. Most of the furniture was saved. Loss, \$1,000. Cause of fire unknown.

Mr. W. C. Dobie, of Port Arthur, formerly of Glencoe, has leased Mr. McGovern's large brick store on Cumberland street, in the former place, and intends opening a grocery store on the 1st of November.

The Free Press says, Henry Potts was arrested for the third time on Monday on another charge of conspiring to defraud. The officers are also seeking for James M. Dykes and Frank Waterworth on similar charges.

Mr. Duncan McCallum, of Mosa, while working in the field one day last week discovered a raspberry bush which was well loaded with ripe raspberries. Ripe raspberries are a luxury not often enjoyed around here in October.

While boring for water on the farm of Angus Courtney, near Courtwright, a vein of natural gas was struck, and all Thursday night sand and gravel was thrown to a height of fifty feet from the well, covering the ground for acres around.

Mr. Neil McLean, lot 29, 7th con., Euphemia, had an artesian well sunk on his farm about three weeks ago, and a fine flow of pure water was the result. It is still bubbling up a distance of some two feet with no appearance of failing.

The Mosa and Ekfrid Plowing Match Association met at the McAlpine House on Saturday. There was a good attendance. It was decided to hold the annual plowing match on Wednesday, November 9th, after which the meeting adjourned till the 29th inst.

We regret this week to chronicle the death of Mrs. E. E. Adams, of this place, which occurred yesterday morning from typhoid fever. Deceased was a daughter of the Rev. S. Kappele, of Hamilton, formerly of Glencoe, and had been but a short time married.

The death occurred at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. H. Harris, Back street, Southwold, Friday evening, of Mr. Duncan Campbell, one of the most widely known and generally respected residents of Elgin. Deceased had reached the age of 99 years.

The streets were crowded on Saturday, a great many being in town to receive their prize money for exhibits at the Mosa and Ekfrid Fair, which was being paid on that day. From a business view the day was not, however, any better than an ordinary Saturday.

In the tour which the Rev. W. Henderson, of this place, recently took to the Pacific Coast he travelled about 7,000 miles and gave twenty-one lectures on "Bible Lands" illustrated by numerous articles of those countries. The press in every place he lectured spoke in glowing terms of the manner in which he handled his subject.

Large shipments of apples are being made daily from Glencoe, and would be larger but for the fact that barrels and cars cannot be supplied fast enough. The buyers here are Dixon Bros., of Hamilton, and John A. Leitch, of this place. The price, \$1 a barrel; those selling to pick the fruit, draw the empty barrels to the orchard, and when filled to deliver them at the railway depot.

Struthers' bank, a private institution at Essex Centre, was broken into by thieves some time during Friday night, the safe blown and \$1,700 in currency stolen. Two men were arrested in Detroit the night following on suspicion of being the burglars.

Mrs. George Smith, daughter of C. J. Campbell, of Ekfrid, died a few days ago. Deceased, who had been married a little over a year, had been ailing for about a fortnight with disease of the liver. She was in her 22nd year. The remains were interred in the Longwood cemetery, the cortege being unusually large.

The annual convention of the Sabbath School Association of Canada will be held in Queen's Ave. Methodist Church, London, on the 25th, 26th and 27th inst., opening on Tuesday at 3 p. m. The most celebrated Sunday School workers of Canada and the United States are to be present, and a large delegation is expected.

The joint committee of the Middlesex and Lambton County Councils, opened tenders the other day for the construction of certain wooden bridges on the eastern boundary of Lambton, and disposed of them as follows: The contract for the Hardy bridge was awarded to Isaac Crouse, London, for \$600; that for the Little Bear Creek bridge on the western boundary of Mosa to M. C. McFayre, of Mosa, for \$297; and for the little Bear Creek east to D. McPhail, for \$293.

One day last week a telegram was received here that a gang of burglars were on their way west and to be on the lookout for them. A couple of suspicious looking characters arrived on the accommodation train the same night and a strict watch was kept on their movements by several of the townspeople. They left, however, on the next train going east. One of our business men, who had his safe blown open a few years ago, anticipating another visit from the fraternity, has posted a notice on his safe to inform them that the door is not locked.

In the prize list of the Mosa and Ekfrid Union Show last week some errors occurred. The awards for crock butter, not less than 20 pounds, should have read—1st, John A. Dobie; 2nd, John Whitlock; 3rd, John Trestrain. Half bushel Indian corn, yellow, in ear, 1st John A. Dobie; 2nd, J. S. Walker; 3rd, Jas. Walker. Half bushel Dent seed corn, in ear, 1st, Jas. Henderson; 2nd, Joseph Siddall; 3rd, John Trestrain. In justice to the Secretary of the Ekfrid Society it may be stated that the reason the prize list was not furnished earlier for publication was owing to one of the judges' books not having been returned promptly to the Secretary.

The opening meeting of the debating society, S. S. No. 9, Mosa, was held on Friday night, 4th Oct., when the school-house was filled to the very doors by people from far and near. Debate—"Resolved, that city is better than country life." After being hotly contested for some time, decision was given by referees in favor of the negative. Then came a series of recitations, songs, etc., which were well executed and afforded a great deal of amusement to all. The meeting then adjourned to meet on the 21st inst., when the subject—"Resolved, that more information can be gained by travelling than by reading," will be debated. Captains, George Gillies and Hugh McTavish. A good time is anticipated.

The subject of establishing a literary society or reading room for the winter is now occupying the minds of those literarily inclined. Either one would fill a want long felt, and be a creditable acquisition to the village. Talk of leading the young into honorable lives of industry and usefulness by suppressing the liquor traffic, gambling and other vices! What alternative has the village to offer them in the way of pastime or amusement? Observation during a number of years residence in Glencoe leads to the remark that the degraded young man has more reason to credit his downfall to the lack of good social advantages than to any other cause. If the attractions of the bar-rooms and gambling resorts afford greater scope for enjoyment than our social institutions human nature impels the young man to give them the preference every time.

The house and part of contents of Alfred Dixon, 5th concession, Zone, was destroyed by fire on Monday evening of last week, under peculiar circumstances. This is the third or fourth time his buildings have been fired. He also claims that large sums of money have been stolen from him at different times. About three weeks ago he had two head of cattle die, supposed to be poisoned. His immediate neighbors are all good and peaceful farmers, in well-to-do circumstances, and are surprised at the repeated depredations committed on the above, while all others are left alone. There is always something mysterious about the way in which these acts are done and apparently no effort made to trace up the guilty party. Mr. Dixon is an old man and a cripple, and supposed by some not to be able to leave his bed, while others have seen him out and about the yard.—Bothwell Times.
