
WHERE SHALL THE

A symposium on "Where Shall the Negro Live?" is published in the November 14th issue of Christian Work, a religious weekly review (70 Fifth Avenue, New York), with answers to the question ranging from James Weldon Johnson, secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, to H. W. Evans, head of the Ku Klux Klan. The Klan point of view, which is also that of Senator Coleman L. Blease, of South Carolina, and Governor Thomas G. McLeod, of South Carolina, is that Negroes should be segregated from whites.

Christian Work introduces as follows the letter of the N. A. A. C. P.

James Weldon Johnson, the distinguished Negro poet and secretary of National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, which is helping to bring a defender to the defenseless among the Negroes and doing us all a service by calling our attention to the wrongs from which they suffer, answered as follows:

"The only suggestion I have to make that if a colored family legally purchases a house in any neighborhood and conducts itself in accordance with the laws of the community and of decency, it has a right to stay there and to be accorded the guarantees of the common decencies of a civilized, Christian community. I cannot see any other course that can be pursued which would not contradict and stultify all our claims to democracy and Christianity. A city street is not in any way a social rendezvous. The act that a man lives next door or in he same block places no social obligaions upon his neighbors. In this city unities, in which they should live? employees. do not see how we could take one ep and not follow it through without g illogical and foolish."
