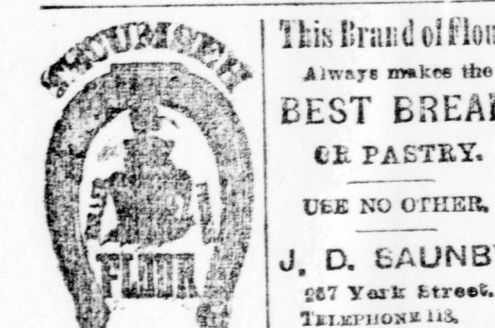

hours a day, to the corresponding relief
of the steam pumps and the economy
of fuel.

—Mr. Frank Briscoe, formerly assistant
secretary of the London Association, who
is visiting in town for a few days, gave a
good talk at the Y. M. C. A. meeting yester-

—In reply to a telegraphic inquiry as to
the condition of Sir Frank Smith, the
following was received: "Three ribs
fractured, but no serious results antici-
pated. He passed a good night, and is in
good spirits."

Mrs. Mary Patrick, of London West, has
issued a writ for \$500 damages against her
husband, Charles Patrick, of Maple street.

the Dundas street bridge into the village,
Patrick had her arrested on a charge of
vagrancy. She remained in jail for a week,
but the charges were dismissed.

News From Afar.

The Rev. O. R. Lambly, M.A., one of the
delegates to the General Conference, has
just received a letter from his daughter in
Japan, conveying the pleasing intelligence
of a prosperous voyage and of her safe
arrival in the land of the rising sun. The
letter was written on the 21st inst. in the
mountain home of the missionaries, where
Miss Lambly expected to enjoy two weeks'
rest before entering upon her work in the
Girls' College in Tokio. Miss Lambly
states that friends of the missionaries need
have no fears in regard to any trouble or
personal danger resulting from the war now
in progress.

In the Matter of Water.

The water commissioners held their usual
meeting last evening, with the following
members present: Commissioner Cowan,
Engineer Moore, Chairman Jones, Inspect-
ors Plawton and Platt and Mayor Eassey.
K. H. Cowan's application for water main
on Richmond street, north of Victoria, was
laid over for him to get other residents on
the block to petition for it. Mr. J.
McKinnon wanted a main put in on
Beaconsfield street, so that the road
would not be torn up when it
is macadamized. Granted. A letter
was read from Mr. George Glasgow,
refusing to pay for lawn service. Filed for
future reference. The Westminster Town-
ship Council stated that a culvert on the
Line Road needed repairs, and was neces-
sary for the safety of the main. The city
will make the repairs and the township will
pay half the cost. George White & Sons
complained that their meter was incorrect.
The engineer will test it. The engineer's
report recommended: 1. That A. Ander-
son be granted a separate main on Pic-
cadilly street. 2. That the claim of over-
charge be granted to the Carling Brew-
ing Company for the extra water
being used on account of damage
done to their spring drain by the city floods
in May last. 3. That an inch and a half
pipe be laid from the Mount Pleasant main
to Mr. J. C. Kennedy's house. 4. That
Mr. C. R. Somerville be granted a fire
service, he pay the cost and a seal to be
placed on the hose. 5. That a fire hydrant
be placed on Nelson street east. 6. That
a four-inch main be laid on Bathurst street,
between William and Maitland, at a cost
of \$300. Adopted. An application for a
main on Dorinda street was referred to the
engineer. A large number of accounts
were passed.
