—Mr. R. O. Brooks, of Windsor, was in the city yesterday attending the funeral of his sister, Mrs. Arthur E. Peters. Mrs. Geo. Osterhout, another sister, from Tonawanda, N. Y., is also here.

## POSTAL PARCELS.

It having come to the knowledge of the Dominion Customs Department that the practice has obtained at some ports of allowing post parcels of large value to be included in the general entry prepared and passed by the customs clerk in charge of the post parcels branch after the duty has been collected, instead of insisting on the importer himself passing the entry at the custom house, collectors are to see that in future all packages received by mail, and being of a greater value than \$10, must be entered in the "Long Room" by the importer or his agent, and must be treated in all respects in the same way as similar goods arriving by ordinary freight or other trains or by vessels or other means of transportation.

## "CHARLIE'S AUNT."

"Charlie's Aunt," the comedy which has made a great hit in two continents, was produced for the first time in London last night before an audience that almost filled the Opera House. The company was under Charles Frohman's management, and was very good, though not his best. "Charlie's Aunt" has not the slightest literary merit, but is uproariously funny nevertheless. Of course the whole skit revolves around the impersonation by a young nobleman of Charlie's Aunt, a widow worth millions, in the disguise of whom the affable young nobleman impersonates two young ladies and together too much affection to please their lovers. The ardent wooing of the supposed aunt by two gray-haired gentlemen with an eye to business, occasions some highly ludicrous situations which are most cleverly contrived by the playwright. Willis Searle, as the bogus aunt, bore the burden of the piece, and it fell on capable shoulders. He displayed rare powers of mimicry and his byplay was admirable. Mr. Allen as Spettigue ranked next in merit, the other roles being comparatively subordinate. The audience enjoyed many hearty laughs, and "Charlie's Aunt" therefore fulfilled her sole purpose.

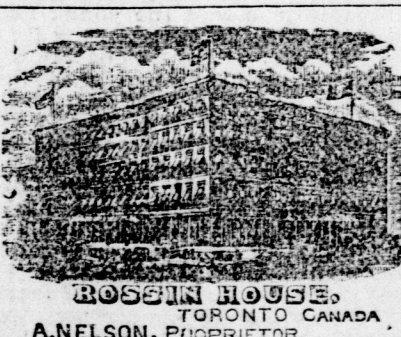
