MR. MERCIER'S TRIAL.
The Ex-Mercier's Elongated Plea for a speedy hearing ignored.
QUEBEC, Oct. 20.—A large number of citizens were in the court to hear the Mercier trial. Mr. Dunbar, Q.C., moved that the case of Queen vs. Alfred Morrisette, charged with forgery, be proceeded with. Mr. Greenshield, Q.C., in behalf of Hon. Mr. Mercier, insisted that the case of the Queen vs. the Hon. Mr. Mercier and Ernest Pacaud take precedence. Mr. Dunbar said the crown considered it their duty to first proceed with the trial of those in jail. Hon. Mr. Mercier addressed the court, asking that his case be proceeded with at once. Let the consequence be what it may, he felt entitled to the right, as a lawyer and ex-Premier of the Province of Quebec. He had his honor to defend and the honor of his family. "If my title as a father of a family is not enough, my title as a British subject you cannot take away from me," concluded an eloquent appeal by saying he would stay in court day after day and if he was not accorded his trial then he would say there was no justice in this country.
Judge Blanchet said it was not a political case and he was obliged to follow the regular practice of the court. He ruled that the case of the Queen vs. Morrisette be proceeded with.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—R. W. Smylie, of Detroit, formerly of London, is in the city.

—The Court of Revision met last evening and confirmed the measurements of the Emery street drain.

—Mrs. R. Robb, of Chiselmur, has arrived in the city and accepted a position as nurse in the hospital.

—The attending physicians report that Miss Henderson, shot on Saturday last at St. Thomas, is still improving.

—Government Inspector Christie is inspecting the London Asylum. Government Architect Tully is also looking after the additions to the institution.

—Mrs. Robert Carfrae, Mrs. Samuel Scoville, Mrs. John Moulle and Miss Minnie Dixon, of this city, attended the funeral of Morton Dixon at Glenora.

—In the Police Court report of last Saturday it was stated that James Springer was charged with non-support of his wife. It appears that such was not the case, the reporter having been misinformed.

—Andrew Denholm, editor and proprietor of the *Bienheim News*, was married on Wednesday to Miss Tena McDonald, third daughter of Mr. Alex. McDonald, Stratford. They were married quietly by Rev. M. L. Leitch and left for a trip to New York.

—The *Chicago Herald* says Mr. Murray Anderson has just closed an important real estate transaction in that city. The property is situated on the corner of Cottage Grove and Indiana avenues, 110 feet by 227 feet. Mr. Anderson, as trustee for the heirs—Mrs. Isaac Anderson and Mrs. J. Robertson—has leased the estate to Mr. H. Tilton for 99 years. The rental is at the rate of \$15,000 per annum, or 5 per cent. on \$300,000. The building to be erected is to be four stories high, and to cost not less than \$250,000.

—Wednesday, Nov. 2, Robert Downing, the foremost American tragedian, will come to London with a grand scenic production of "Virginia," and the following night he will be seen in "The Gladiator." Mr. Downing's engagement, following so closely that of the eminent English actor, Mr. E. S. Willard, is notable, as showing that which is the very best in the dramatic art. Mr. Downing's company is a powerful troupe, comprising 21 of the best actors in the legitimate field.

—Yesterday afternoon Bro. John Sara, of Lorne Lodge, A. F. and A. M., Glenora, was buried under Masonic auspices at Mount Pleasant Cemetery. The Transcript says of deceased: "Mr. Sara was a man well-known and highly respected, having been elected a member of the village council last January. He formerly resided in London, and was the last surviving member of the family. The remains were taken to London for interment yesterday afternoon, and were accompanied to the train by a large number of our citizens, including the members of the Masonic and Foresters' lodges, to which deceased belonged. Mr. Sara was in his 34th year, and leaves a wife and two children."

—No. 2 committee of the council met last evening, and were present Ald. Garratt (in the chair), Jones, Shaw, O'Meara, Bartlett, R. Ironside and Secretary Bell. G. C. Robb, chief engineer of the city, reported that he had inspected the steam boilers in the City Hall found them all sound and in good condition. Filed. The city engineer called attention to the wretched manner in which the city was placed in regard to names of streets. In many cases no signs were up at all. Laid over. The communication of A. Hagett, asking the committee to compel R. Hall to remove a fence erected on a public highway, and the petition of E. H. Haynes et al. for compensation for taking up and relaying the tile drain on St. James street between George and Talbot streets, made necessary by the city having Talbot street graded and the frost penetrating to and destroying the tile, were referred to the engineer at his report. The communication of Geo. S. Weir for damages on account of injury to vehicle, caused by defective street, was filed, the city not being liable. The payment of \$210.83 was passed and the committee adjourned.

—Messrs. J. B. Cook (chairman), J. S. Dewar, W. J. Craig, Anderson, D. W. Blackwell, J. Tanton, A. O. Jeffery and Inspector Carson were at a meeting of No. 2 committee of the Board of Education last evening. James J. Jany, janitor at the Collegiate Institute, applied for help, as the new rooms greatly increased the work. The committee will recommend that Mr. Jany be authorized to employ not more than \$3 per week until otherwise directed. Mr. Gray appeared in reference to his account for cleaning closets at Maple avenue school of \$51, and the committee decided to recommend \$40. Mr. Perry, inspector of buildings, will start work on Monday, Oct. 24. He was requested to report on desirability of additional double windows at the Collegiate Institute. Some additional blackboards will be ordered. The matter of ventilation at Freeman school was referred to J. S. Dewar with new plans for the Quebec and Worley road schools were amended and directed. The kindergarten on Rectory street will be located near the corner of York and Rectory.

A Masonic Event.
Last night Rt. Wor. Bro. Alex. Hess, D. D. G. M. of London District, No. 3, A. F. and A. M., G. R. C., paid an official visit to Kilwinning Lodge, No. 64, this city. Among those present in the east were: Rt. Wor. Bros. R. W. Barker, G. S. W. A. B. Munson, P. D. G. M.; Wor. Bros. J. Smith, W. G. McMillan, W. Thornton, R. Bonney and A. G. McWhinney, also Bros. G. S. Willis, C. F. New, of Cambridge. The third degree was exemplified in a creditable manner by Wor. Bro. A. A. Campbell and officers of the

lodge, after which an adjournment was made to the banqueting room, where all partook of coffee and light refreshments, and a pleasant hour was spent in singing and speech-making.

These will be represented by the young romantic actor, Mr. Edward Vroom. Says the *Ottawa Journal* of "Don Cesar de Bazan": "The piece is well staged with new and appropriate scenery, and the cast, with scarcely an exception, was a superior one. In fact a smoother or more agreeable rendition of this charming play has seldom been witnessed here. Mr. Vroom, as the dashing and impetuous Don Cesar, infused into his part as to call forth frequent and spontaneous applause. He has a fine stage presence, and in his picturesque costumes looked the gay Spanish cavalier to the well, who, as Marquis, fully enlisted the sympathies of the audience, which found vent in the usual manner. Miss Gifford played the minor character of Lazarillo most acceptably. Mr. Arbuckle, as Don Jose, was all that could be desired."

THAT AGREEMENT AGAIN.
The Aldermen Once More Discuss Street Railway Matters.

The City Solicitor Advises About Forty Changes, but the Council Amend Only One Clause—The Proposal to be Submitted to the Old Company.

Clause 25 of the proposal of the new street railway company reads as follows:

"Subject to the powers of the corporation of the city of London in that behalf, and subject to the rights, if any, of the London Street Railway Company, the corporation shall not for a period of twenty years from the passing of this agreement, grant to any other person, corporation or firm the right to construct and operate a surface street railway by electricity as a motive power unless the proposers shall neglect or refuse to commence the construction of any new line in the city upon any street or streets after being requested by a resolution of the City Council to construct such line, or having been so requested shall fail to complete such line within one year from the request; then, and in such event only, the city shall be at liberty to grant to any other person or persons the right to build such line and to operate a street railway by electricity as a motive power thereon. It being understood and agreed that in the event of an amalgamation of the said proposers with the London Street Railway Company, or in the event of the London Street Railway Company accepting this agreement, neither the proposers nor the London Street Railway Company shall be understood to have acquired any right to operate an electric street railway upon the streets now occupied by the London Street Railway Company."

To this clause the city solicitor objected at a special meeting of the City Council last evening as not being in the city's interests. He suggested that the clause should be changed so as to read as follows:

"Subject to the powers of the corporation of the city of London in that behalf, and subject to the rights, if any, of the London Street Railway Company, the corporation shall not, for a period of twenty years from the passing of the necessary bylaw giving effect to this proposal, grant to any other person, firm or corporation the right to construct and operate a surface street railway by electricity as a motive power; provided, however, that, in case the proposers shall neglect or refuse to commence any new line or part of a line upon any of the streets mentioned in paragraph 2 of this proposal within the time limited by paragraph 2 of this proposal, the corporation of the city of London shall be at liberty to grant to any other person, firm or corporation the right to build and operate such line or lines, crossing where necessary, and to use electricity as the motive power thereon. Provided also that in case the proposers should neglect or refuse to build or operate any new line within the city upon any street or streets not mentioned in this proposal after being requested by a two-thirds vote of the council of the said corporation to construct such line, which request the said council, by a two-thirds vote as aforesaid, may from time to time make, or, having been so requested, shall fail to complete such new line within one year from the making of such request, then, and in such cases also the corporation of the city of London shall be at liberty to grant to any other person, firm or corporation the right to build and operate such line or lines, crossing where necessary, and to use electricity as the motive power thereon. This shall not be taken to justify a refusal by the proposers to build the lines upon the streets mentioned in paragraph 2 hereof within the time limited thereby by paragraph 2 hereof. It being understood and agreed that in the event of an amalgamation of the said proposers with the London Street Railway Company, or in the event of the London Street Railway Company accepting this agreement, neither the proposers nor the London Street Railway Company shall be understood to have acquired any right to operate an electric street railway upon the streets now occupied by the London Street Railway Company."

Mr. Ivey at first objected to this as he thought that the whole proposal would have to be gone into again from beginning to end, and to this he would agree under no circumstances. He would agree to striking out the word "new" after the words "to commence the construction of any" and inserting after the words "upon any street or streets" the words "whether mentioned in this agreement or not." He finally, however, agreed to Mr. Meredith's clause

The city solicitor had written a lengthy letter suggesting several changes (about 42 in number), but Mr. Ivey would not, under any consideration, submit to this.

Ald. Judd asked why the letters had been kept back. He had not heard of them before.

Ald. Gartshore said the meeting referred to resolved itself into a conference between the two solicitors. He had thought that Mr. Ivey and the city solicitor arranged matters satisfactorily.

Ald. Judd charged that things had been rushed, and condemned Ald. Gartshore.

The city clerk said the letter was before the council on the night that Ald. Parnell's resolution was moved.

The council finally decided to consider the whole agreement again, acting on Mr. Meredith's suggestions.

It was then moved that Mr. Meredith's clause 25 be adopted.

A motion to consider the agreement taking into consideration Mr. Meredith's 42 suggestions was lost.

It was moved that the agreement as amended by the adoption of the amended clause 25 be adopted. The vote was a tie.

Ald. O'Meara had not voted before but voted *yea* and the matter was settled.

Mr. Ivey accepted the agreement as amended and signified his willingness to sign it.

Ald. Gartshore moved that the amended proposal be submitted to the present street railway company. Carried.

Mayor Spencer, Ald. J. Heaman, Yates, O'Meara, Monte, Jones, W. Heaman, Gartshore, Hannah, Bartlett, Dreaney, Fitzgerald, Judd, Shaw, Parnell, City Clerk Kingston and Sergeant-at-Arms Merritt were present.
