ATHLETICS.

A unique contest is fixed to take place at Stamford Bridge grounds, London, on Nov. 28. It will be a ten-mile handicap run, open only to men over 50 years old. Sir John Astley is the principal promoter, and already several noted pedestrians of bygone days have entered. These are: Jackson, the "American Deer"; Sam Barker, "Choppy"; Warburton, Old Kells, W. Springall and W. Bishop. Each competitor will receive 50 yards start for every year he is over 50.

A Lowell, Mass., dispatch says that at Huntington Hall last night nineteen men

mounted a platform, and Louis Cyr, the world-renowned strong man, getting under a raised platform, men and all from the floor. The aggregate weight was 3,391 pounds. The feat was done on a wager that Cyr could not beat Kennedy's lift in harness of 3,200 pounds and a fraction. Cyr is from St. John, Que. He is 5 feet 10 inches in height, measures 58 inches around the chest, 21½ inches biceps, 22 inches neck, 46 inches waist, 32 inches high, 28 inches calves and weighs 312 pounds. His brother Peter, who weighs 168 pounds, lifted a 469-pound dumb bell with one finger.

At New Orleans Charles Dickson was elected to the presidency of the Olympic Club to fill the place vacated by Charles Noel.

WASHINGTON AND THE VATICAN

Possibility of the Appointment of a Papal Legate to Washington.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—The advisability of placing at Washington a duly accredited representative of the Vatican may be dealt with at the conference now in session here. For many years American statesmen have disagreed upon the question of the Government recognizing the authority of a papal legate. It has been held that if the President should receive as one of his diplomatic family a representative of the Pope, the Vatican might be construed as a recognition of the Pope's claim of temporal sovereignty. There is a likelihood that following the discussion of the matter by the archbishops, Mr. Sattoli may be induced to bring it to a crisis by reporting to the Vatican that steps should be taken looking to the appointment of a papal legate to Washington.

"FINDING" IS NOT "KEEPING."

At Least It Isn't in a Case Brought Out in an Albany Court.

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 17.—Judge Wilkinson, the city court, has decided an interesting case, involving a point of law seldom brought up for adjudication. Two years ago some one entered the Albany Exchange National Bank and, going to one of the customers' desks, began to count a roll of money. In departing the person left behind \$50.

Henry B. Loucks, an Albany lawyer, who happened to find the money lying on the desk, handed it over to Cashier John J. Gallego, asking him to turn it over to him as the rightful owner, in finding it after it had been lost. Cashier Gallego declined to surrender the money, however, holding that, as it was lost in the bank building, the bank was the proper custodian of the money until the owner appeared.

Mr. Loucks brought suit for the recovery of possession of the money. The decision by Justice Wilkinson finds a verdict for the defendant. The opinion is a long one and cites a number of cases involving a similar point of law, but affected by various conditions. In brief, Justice Wilkinson holds that under the circumstances shown by both parties to the suit the finder has no legal right to the money, and that the bank is its proper custodian.

TIDINGS FROM TORONTO.

The Corporation and the Street Railway Company Clash—Election Attendance at an Annexation Meeting.

TORONTO, Nov. 17.—The city and the street railway company are at daggers drawn today. War has been declared by the city engineers on the objectionable wooden poles, and men went to work over the poles chopping them down or pulling them up. Engineer Keating protested in vain against the erection of the poles, and they sent word to the company that they would have to take measures as above. The gang of men employed by the city engineer proceeded this afternoon until eighteen poles were removed when they were stopped by an injunction issued by Judge Armour and not returnable on Tuesday next. A compromise will probably be arrived at tonight.

A. Macdonald called a meeting in the E. End to-night to discuss the question of annexation. When time was called it was nobly but, Macdonald and a reporters present, and the meeting

ended.

ELLINGTON W. C. T. U.

Officers of Prohibition in Council—Addressed by Women Workers—Election of Officers.

ELGIN, Nov. 17.—The annual W. C. T. U. convention for the county of Wilfrid was held yesterday and to-day in the city of Drayton, there being a very good attendance. The annual reports were presented and in the evening an open meeting held in the Bible Christian Church at which the Rev. Mr. Willoughby presided. The president of the county, Mrs. Drayton, delivered the annual address. Mrs. G. Beatty, of Fergus, read an interesting paper entitled "The Bible our best weapon for prohibition." Mrs. Drayton, of Guelph, also addressed the meeting.

The following officers were elected: Mrs. Drayton, Guelph, president; Mrs. Grant, Huron, vice-president; Mrs. Drayton, Huron, recording secretary; Mrs. R. H. Fergus, Fergus, corresponding secretary; St. Catharines, treasurer.

The convention adjourned to meet at Elwood next year.

What U. S. Grangers Want.

OSCEOLA, N. H., Nov. 18.—At the annual Grange session to-day, Mortimer H. Head, lecturer, said that among the causes which he found most generally passed and asked for at this time in the pages of the country were rural free mail delivery, postal telegraph and telephone, Government ownership and control of same in the interest of a quicker dissemination of news, market reports, weather forecasts, etc.

Talk of a New Departure in the Cattle Trade.

MONTREAL, Nov. 17.—There is talk in the cattle trade over the advisability of future admitting American cattle into Canada. Now that this country is scheduled Great Britain the impression is that there is no reason to exclude American cattle, and a number of exporters would like to go into the business of shipping American Live Stock Association is to be asked to express an opinion on the matter. Regulars are to be sent to leading stock dealers in Quebec and Ontario asking for an opinion, and these will be submitted to the Canadian Government.

"BLACK PEPIN BUTTER"

Experiments Made at the Ontario Agricultural College Gave Poor Results.

GUELPH, Nov. 18.—The article purporting to give an account of the wonderful discovery of a compound, and which makes 150 per cent. more butter, also an account of its use by Australian dairymen, having been copied so largely by the Canadian press, we were called upon to report upon the merits of "Black Pepin," so called. Accordingly I sent 38 cents in American stamps to the Concord Chemical Company, New York, and in a few days received a reddish looking powder, sufficient, it is said, to increase in churning two gallons of cream. In the letter were two circulars signed by the Cloud-Harlin Company, Toronto. One of these was headed "A Fortune to Farmers," and went on to show how quickly a farmer might become rich by the use of "Black Pepin" in the dairy, and that \$32 per day could be made by agents selling the compound.

The other circular gave directions for the use of "Black Pepin" in churning. Said directions are copyrighted by the Cloud-Harlin Company, and retail for \$2.50 each. Each box of pepin sells for \$2.50 and will make 500 pounds of butter. I may say that I wrote Cloud, Harlin & Co., Toronto, on Nov. 5, asking for further particulars and more pepin, but at this writing (Nov. 14), I have received no word from them.

The directions on the envelope for dissolving the powder were as follows: Melt sufficient butter to make two teacupfuls of cream, then add the pepin to the cream, and stir well, and keep hot till all is dissolved. When dissolved it is ready for use. This sample is sufficient for churning two gallons. Use according to directions for making butter with Black Pepin. It will require three or four churnings to get the best results, but this sample will give you a good idea."

I followed directions, boiling the powder for one and a half hours in a water bath, and found it insoluble. I also boiled it in water and found it but very slightly soluble. It was also insoluble in alcohol and in dilute muriatic acid. After boiling for a time it resembles butter color somewhat.

On Nov. 7 we made an experiment, with the following results: Eight and one-half pounds of cream, which tested 15.4 per cent. of fat, contained about one and one-half pounds of butter, were treated according to directions. (The directions say that for each gallon of cream add two pounds of melted butter when the butter "breaks.") When finished there were three and one-half pounds of worked and salted butter. After deducting the melted butter we had but one and one-half pounds of butter, which was about the original amount contained in the churn. The butter-milk contained 9 of 1 per cent. of fat.

On Nov. 12 I took 15 pounds of cream, testing 17.4 per cent. of fat, that had been properly ripened. It was evenly divided after mixing. One-half was churned according to "Directions for Making Butter with Black Pepin," and the other half churned in the ordinary way. The first, or pepin churning, after deducting the melted butter added, produced one and one-half pounds of butter. The second lot, to which no pepin was added, produced two and one-half pounds of butter. The butter-milk from the pepin churning contained 1.6 per cent. of fat, while the other contained 0.4 of 1 per cent. of fat. The difference of three-quarters of a pound of butter in favor of no pepin, I would account for in this way: In handling the melted butter there was more or less loss by sticking to the utensils, while the butter-milk contained over one-quarter of a pound of butter. There would also be some difference in the working of the two samples, as no two lots can be worked to contain exactly the same percentage of water, etc. These two experiments, in which we have used all the "Black Pepin" sent us, show no advantage whatever by using it, while the extra labor involved is double.

In the meantime I would advise farmers to continue making butter by the latest improved methods, hoping to make the ordinary profits and give "Black Pepin" and all other fish-bait compounds a wide berth. It is possible that some new kind of food may be manufactured from milk. It will not be better, but something which contains more of the solids of milk than does either butter or cheese. If anything new develops we shall be glad at all times to give the public the benefit.

A WILD WIND WAVE

Sweeps Through an Illinois Town—One Person Killed and Fifteen Injured.

REXBURG, Ill., Nov. 18.—At 3:30 this morning a cyclone swept over this place, destroying 35 houses, killing a boy and injuring fifteen other persons. Two churches, the town hall and jail and a newspaper office were among the buildings leveled. The wind was some in the midst of a driving rain storm. The storm came from the south and cleared a path 200 yards wide through the town. The cyclone first demolished the Catholic Church and school and the rest of the German Lutheran Church was blown down. After destroying several barns and tearing away fences it struck the large two-story residence of Peter Kendall, which was of solid stone, and crumbled to bits. Mrs. Kendall was severely injured. A large double brick house occupied by D. D. Perry as a dwelling, office and composing room was entirely destroyed. The family were buried in the ruins, but managed to extricate themselves without serious injury. Peterson's agricultural warehouse was blown down and fourteen other residences were destroyed.

THE VICTIMS.

The 11-year-old son of Mrs. Jacob Koch was killed instantly and this was a fatal injury. The injured include the following: Mrs. Jacob Koch, fatally; Mrs. Peter Kendall, Mrs. Peter Karden, Mrs. Louis Roger, Julius Henn, Mr. Heitman, Adrien Starr, Miss Sparrow, Mrs. John Manderfeldt, Mr. and Mrs. D. D. Perry. Many of the people are without clothing and shelter, and the cold rain makes their situation the more deplorable. The property loss is estimated at \$100,000.

The Gilcher Found.

ESCANABA, Nov. 17.—The steamer Gilcher was found on High Island, Lake Michigan, by fishermen on Monday last. She was a black schooner, 22 feet long. She says Capt. Neil Gallagher, of Beaver Island.

Nearly \$18,000 a Foot for New York Property.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—The property Nos. 100, 102 and 104 Broadway and No. 1 Pine street was bought to-day by the American Surety Company for \$1,400,000, equivalent to \$17,618 a square foot.

Kingston's Fair a Failure.

KINGSTON, Nov. 17.—There is every prospect that the Midland Central Fair ground will be sold to meet the liabilities upon it. The directors of the fair do not feel like carrying on the show when there is so little public interest in it. The debt is \$10,000.

STRUCK A SALT SPRING!

A Bonanza Discovered on the C. P. R. Property in Windsor.

WINDSOR, Nov. 17.—For some months the C. P. R. have been drilling for salt on their premises near the depot. Yesterday, at a depth of 1,127 feet the drill rod suddenly dropped a few feet and then made great headway. After drilling a little farther the drill was pumped and brine of an exceedingly strong quality was brought to the surface. It is the intention of the company to erect one of the finest salt plants in existence. The salt will be manufactured by a new process. The drillers say it is the best well they ever saw. The plant will furnish employment to 50 or 75 hands.
