

Oh, boys, was that Fly a bussard?

Col. Matheson Held the Floor Most of the Time.

Assailing the Government on General Principles-Mr. Garrow and Dr. Barr Heard From.

Toronto, Aug. 6.-Col. Matheson, the financial oracle of the opposition, held the floor yesterday for most of the time. Referring to the seconder of the address in reply, he thought his flattery of the government would be too fulsome to suit his constituents. Why did not the member for West Northumberland follow the example of the honorable member for London? The speaker alleged that Col. Leys was promised the Normal School as a bribe for London. But he knew the men he had to deal with; he knew that no reliance could be placed upon them, and he was informed that the member for London took the ministry by the throat, took the minister of education by the throat, rather, and forced them to pledge themselves for the building before he entered the house or took the oath of office. In West Northumberland they had Victoria College, bought two years ago, and permitted to lie idle. Why did not Mr. Clarke, like the member for London, insist that before he made that speech they should put those buildings in order? Col. Matheson also charged that the two Oxfords were bribed by public works. and the Algomas by colonization roads. In Russell the returning officer was almost a "nincompoop," said the colonel. The honorable gentleman from

South Perth was sitting in the house owing to the misprinting of the ballots by the men employed by the government in power. The minister of education had bribed his constituency by purchasing at a high figure a large quantity of cordwood for the provincial creamery at Strathroy. With all this bribery it seemed wonderful that the Conservatives should occupy even half the seats in the house. Col. Matheson then turned his attention to Messrs. Gilson and Dryden. The provincial secretary, he sad, was the only cabinet minister who truly represented his constituents. No ministry should meet parliament without having every member of the cabinet with seats in

this house. Mr. Garrow asked: "Had any reputable lawyer in the country pronounced the opinion that on the law as it stands a constable has not the right to vote?" Mr. Whitney-It is rumored that the

attorney-general has. (Opposition applause. Mr. Hardy-Well, the rumor is entirely wrong. (Ministerial applause.) Mr. Garrow (West Huron) said he did not want rumor; he preferred argument. He did not believe there was counsel in Ontario who would venture to say that the constables had no right to vote. Mr. Garrow said he was one of the constable members, having the proud distinction of perhaps having the smallest majority in the house. Mr. Garrow went on to say that West Huron was usually found with the government. True, the majority was not large. He was returned the first time by 112, and the last by 67, which was whittled down by a series of circumstances to nothing at all. (Opposition laughter.) But great men had been defeated before, and if he had been defeated it would have been a very small matter. But he was not defeated. He was there, and intended to remain there. (Ministerial

applause.) He protested against the holding of morning sessions. Dr. Barr (Dufferin) filled up the rest of the session. He said it was not the intention of the Conservatives to take away the legal vote of any man in the Province of Ontario. On the question of ministers holding portfolios without seats. Dr. Barr said that with two members defeated the government should have resigned, and then Mr. Whitney could have formed a ministry which could have gone to the country and have been handsomely returned
