The majorgeneral considered that the men had improved wonderfully during their stay in barracks here.

RAILWAY BROTHERHOOD BUILD. ING.

St. Louis, Mo., March 23 .- At a meeting of the prominent members of the different railway brotherhoods at the headquarters of the Order of Railway Telegraphers, in this city, steps were taken for the erection of a railway brotherhood building on the grounds of the Louisiana purchase exposition to be held in this city in 1903. L. W. Quick, of the O. R. T., was made secretary of a committee to promote the matter. The proposed building will contain offices and lodge rooms, and probably hotel accommo-dation for the visiting members of the different railroad organizations.
