The features of the face are delicate, refined and classically beautiful. All of the new-comers speak English well, some fluently and with perfect accent. They expressed their surprise at the magnitude of the country and the sights they had seen in choice language. They will build three courts, a central one and two minor ones, where a complete Ceylon exhibit will be placed.
