LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

The fire department was called out three times last evening to attend to blazing chimneys.

The annual meeting of the London Cricket Club will be held at the Tecumseh House to-night.

Mr. J. W. Little, of Robinson, Little & Co., leaves on Monday for a business trip to the European markets.

Mr. Armistead, of Huron College, London, filled St. John's pulpit, Tilsonburg, very ably on Sunday.

Bell's English was here yesterday and took Wm. McHenry to the Central. He was accompanied by two prisoners from St. Thomas.

Mr. Frank C. Green, son of the late Thomas Green, who has been absent from the city for a few years, is visiting his old home here. Mr. Green is now a resident of San Francisco, Cal.

The statement that the L. and P. S. R. bonds, which London purports buying from St. Thomas, are in the hands of the Canada Southern Railway Company is pronounced by the St. Thomas Journal as untrue.

Mr. Melzer S. Andrea, relieving agent of the C. P. R., who has been in the city for some time, left last evening for Woodstock. His fellow-boarders at the Grand Pacific hope that he will soon have to return to London.

Head Clerk Fitzgerald, of the Woodmen of the World, has just received information from Senator Vidal that the bill to incorporate this order in the Deseronto finally passed the Senate on March 21, and is now made law.

Patrick Sullivan, the obstreperous London Western, who made himself obnoxious at Gurd's broom factory on Tuesday afternoon, came up before Squire Lacey yesterday afternoon, and was remanded until March 29.

The Rev. A. W. Main's meetings in the First Congregational Church are proving most successful. Last night the lecture room was filled, and everybody appeared to be deeply interested. The meetings will be continued each night this week.

Mr. J. A. Nelles, secretary of the Board of Trade, has received word from Assistant General Manager Shaughnessy of the C. P. R., stating that it will be possible for him to attend the Board of Trade banquet here any time between March 25 and April 7.

The death occurred last night of Mary, the wife of Wm. Stilling, baker, after an illness of six weeks. Mrs. Stilling was 58 years of age and leaves a grown-up family of four daughters and two sons. Mrs. Stilling was a native of Salisbury, Wiltshire, Eng., and had been a resident of Canada for about twenty years. She was a member of Christ Church, and her loss is deeply regretted by a large circle of acquaintances and friends.

A Windsor paper is in receipt of a letter from Mr. George Rankin, of this city, regarding the late Col. Rankin, which he says: "The late Col. Rankin's life was so intimately associated with Catholics and Catholic institutions that he was always regarded by those who knew him best as being in close sympathy with the tenets of the Catholic faith. When, therefore, it is sought to convey the impression that his condition as a voluntary and paying patient at Hotel Dieu was taken advantage of by Father Wagner, of the estimable staff of nurses at that institution, it becomes my sad and trying duty, as his eldest son, to repel and positively deny any such charge or insinuation." He further adds that "although the lamentable addition to the family of a young and promising son, to a mild phrase, of a stranded and misdirected actor, Col. Rankin's worldly affairs at the time of his death have been shockingly misrepresented and heralded abroad throughout the press everywhere."

"My Colleen" at the Grand.

Tony Colleen and his excellent company appeared at the Grand last evening before a good-sized house, and established himself as a favorite deeper than ever in the best of London audiences. Since his last appearance in this city his improvement has been well advanced, and he can now rank as one of the best Irish comedians on the stage. The play is a bright Irish comedy, and is interspersed at intervals with laughable incidents and humorous Irish songs. Farrell had to respond several times to encores. Several members of the company are capable supporters, and all lend a hand in giving a good performance. On account of the successful engagement last night, and next week being a week off, Manager Root announces that they will return to London on Good Friday for two performances, matinee and evening.

"Jane."

The members of Charles Froham's company will make their bow in "Jane" at the Grand Monday night. This vehicle of fiction, proven particularly felicitous for the players, for the parts assumed in this comedy could not be presumed to need serious consideration on the part of the audience; rather one is pleased at brazen burlesque, fantastic follies, and comical complications, all like imparts darting in and out, rushing upon one another, until all is complete tangle and mess. One is whirled away in the vortex of farcical situations until, having enjoyed several good hearty laughs, we think we begin to see the end of it all, when more and almost endless complications come rushing in upon the already burdened sense of the ludicrous. There is material for several comedy farces, all wrapped up in this breezy comedy.

The Syndicate's Latest Deal.

A Vienna correspondent writes: "At a special meeting of the Bayham council Tuesday afternoon, the bylaw granting the Port Huron harbor to the railway syndicate was amended in accordance with the

wishes of President Miller, so as to give the syndicate a deed of the harbor as soon as the railroad is built, a covenant being inserted in the deed binding the syndicate to repair the harbor, so that twelve feet of water will be secured. The harbor is also to be exempted from taxation for a period of ten years from the date of the passing of the bylaw. Who or where the syndicate is that is being represented by Mr. Miller is as yet one of the unsolved mysteries, but we in this little burg are not very particular as to who is at the helm so long as the affair is piloted safely through." The Mr. Miller referred to is the president of the syndicate which has leased the London and Fort Stanley Railway. Evidently they have another handle to their Canadian operations.

The Late Mrs. Sutton.

The death of Jane, wife of Dennis Sutton, lumber merchant, occurred at the family homestead, Claudioboye, on Tuesday, March 14. Deceased was a daughter of the late John Sutton, one of the pioneer settlers of London township. In 1843, the year of her marriage, she came to live in Claudioboye, then called the village of Ireland, where her husband kept store at that time. With the exception of an interval of four years' residence at the Cornet mill where Mr. Sutton started lumbering 37 years ago, she has lived in Claudioboye, and was one of the few remaining early settlers of this place. Mrs. Sutton was reared in the Episcopal faith, but some twenty years ago she united with the Methodist member which she remained a long and faithful till her death, after a long and painful illness of phthisis, which she bore with exemplary patience. Her family consists of her husband, three daughters and five sons. Of these are Mrs. Wells, of Detroit; Mrs. C. J. Reid, of Windsor; Dr. M. Sutton, of Cooksville; George, foreman of the farm at Claudioboye; William, a storekeeper in Vancouver, B. C., and Arthur, a barrister in Calgary. A devoted wife and mother, the family have suffered an irreparable loss in her death. The interment took place on Thursday, March 16, at St. James' Cemetery.

LONDON, CANADA.

London and suburbs have a population of 38,000 persons.

London is situated in the garden of Canada, midway between the Niagara and the Detroit Rivers.

London is the center of nine different lines of railway, giving easy access to the whole continent, and to the lakes and seaboard.

London has direct connection with the three great Canadian lines of railway—the Grand Trunk, the Canadian Pacific, and the Michigan Central.

London controls a line of railway from the city to Port Stanley, on Lake Erie.

Each day more trains arrive at and depart from London than in any other Canadian city in the same time.

London's public water supply is obtained from never-failing pure springs four miles from the city. Their yield is practically unlimited. London has the best drinking water on the continent.

London is an excellent health resort, as it has a lower death rate than any city of its size on the continent, and it has magnificent white sulphur baths within its limits.

London has 1 opera house and 4 public halls.

London has 13 public schools (and a number are under contract), not including kindergarten, 3 R. C. separate schools, 2 ladies' colleges, and 1 collegiate institute.

London has 1 university and 1 medical school.

London has a Conservatory of Music and a School of Elocution.

London has 2 public libraries.

London is an excellent center for manufacturing and commercial enterprises. There are already established wholesale houses for groceries, hardware, drygoods, small wares, boots and shoes, drugs, crockeryware, etc. There are one or more manufactories of furniture, engines, boilers, stoves, furnaces, iron and brass foundries, carriages, burial caskets, railway cars, planing, stamping, and machine tools, oil refining, leather, barrels, machine tools, clothing, cigars, office and school furniture, biscuits and confectionery, mirrors and beveled plate-glass, corsets, furs, beer, washing compounds, acids, woodwork of every description, etc.

London has two daily newspapers (morning and evening editions).

London has two public parks.

London has six banks and eight loan and investment associations.

London has six charitable institutions, two hospitals and seven public buildings.

London has a good street railway, which will be much extended during the year.

London's rate of taxation is 18 mills, which includes all school rates, etc.

London's civic assets are \$2,547,798.84, and the balance of assets over all liabilities is \$422,861.19. The total assessment is \$16,333,097.

London has 44 churches, almost every religious denomination of any importance being represented.

London has an excellent Entomological Society and exhibition, and some of the ablest entomologists to be found in Canada.

London has markets three times weekly, the best in the west. The great Western Fair is held for ten days in September.
