LOCAL MARKET.

London, Wednesday, Nov. 23.

Hay sold like hot cakes today; prices

in the previous week. The condition of

Monday's figures; there were 15 loads of

straw, and prices ranged from \$3 to \$9 per

ton, nearly all at \$5.50.

Straw was scarce, at \$3.50 per load.

The delivery of oats was large for this

day of the week; prices were brisk, at

\$1.03 to \$1.05 per cwt.

The demand for hay should be brisk on

Thursday and Friday.

WEEKLY REVIEW.

There was not as much business trans-

acted on the market the past six days

as in the previous week. The condition of

the roads was a factor in the light de-

livery of produce. The demand is good

in all lines, the only exception being

butcher's meats. Prices are firm, espe-

cially for dressed hogs and potatoes.

Grain—The demand for oats continued

to be brisk; the supply is a little slow,

and as a consequence prices are firm;

sales are made mostly at \$1.03 and \$1.04

per cwt. Barley sells mostly at \$2 and \$1

per cwt. Not much wheat offered; prices

are steady, at \$1.05 per bu. Corn is scarce,

at \$1.05 per bu. Potatoes bring \$1.10 per

cwt. Hay and straw—The supply of hay the

past week was large; prices are easier,

at \$2.50 to \$3.50 for the best loads; there

is a large quantity of hay in the country

to be sold; in Huron County the packers

are paying only \$4.50 per ton in the barn;

in fact, there is hardly a county in On-

tario that the crop of hay this year was

not above the average; it is not likely

that prices will go any higher. Straw

is in demand, at \$3 to \$3.50 per load, or

\$5.50 to \$6 per ton.

Dressed Hogs—The supply is short of

the demand; prices are higher, at \$3.10

to \$3.25 per cwt, mostly at the last-named

figure.

Butter and Eggs—Deliveries of butter

and eggs are fairly large; butter is a

little easier, at 22c to 23c for choice rolls. Eggs

are firm and in good demand, at 22c per

dozen wholesale and 25c retail.

Apples—Sales are good, at \$2.50 to \$3

per barrel for choice hand-picked, or \$1

to \$1.10 per bag; inferior grades sell at

50c to 75c per bag, or \$1.50 to \$2 per

barrel.

Potatoes—There has been a considerable

increase in prices during the week; sales

are made mostly at \$300 per bag; the de-

mand is good.

Poultry—The supply in this line was not

as large as in the preceding week; the

demand is good; turkeys, alive, 10c to

12c per lb. dressed, 12c to 14c; ducks,

dressed, 10c to 12c per lb. or 10c to 12c

per lb.

REVOLT TAINTS

LINE REGIMENTS

Mutinous Spirit Now Prevails

all Sections of the Czar's

Army.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 23.—There was

an exceedingly panicky feeling on the

Bourse today, imperial fairs again

dropping to 84. Government lotteries

and industrial fell several points. Be-

tween quotations the markets were af-

fected by the fear of the spread of

wholesale sedition in the army. The

radical papers are filled with reports

of meetings of soldiers in different

places, and the adopting of resolutions

calling for the public trial of soldiers,

the abolition of the death penalty, and

various other reforms including a re-

duction of the term of service to four

years. The similarity of the resolu-

tions is proof that they were inspired

from a common source and shows the

growth of the revolutionary propaga-

nda among the troops.

The reports from the Manchurian

army are also disquieting. Many of-

ficers and soldiers involved in the plot

at Harbin have been arrested and a

number of agitators who arrived there

from European Russia were caught

redhanded by Gen. Linevitch.

From Tiflis and Kars, Trans-Cau-

casia, come reports that the soldiers

are taking a stand against firing on

the people and private dispatches from

Odessa say the soldiers and sailors at

a meeting held at the university last

night decided, in the event of the Se-

bastopol mutineers bringing the Black

Sea fleet to Odessa, to join the mutin-

ers and take possession of the city.
