The Canadian Northern for Hamilton

Hamilton, Aug. 26.—It was reported here this afternoon that the Canadian Northern has made a similar arrangement with the Grand Trunk to run trains from Toronto to Hamilton as the C. P. R., which now uses the G. T. R. tracks to the city limits.

The C. N. R. will run on the main line to Burlington Junction and then enter the city over the Beach line, coming into the King street station.

A Great Flood at Augusta, Georgia

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 26.—A long-distance telephone message from the Associated Press correspondent at Augusta, says that the city is completely under water. In the downtown portion business houses, telegraph offices and newspaper offices are completely demolished.

There were three deaths in Augusta today, two white people and one negro. The damage to the city and immediate surroundings, it is estimated, will reach half a million dollars.

Havelock Visited by a Bad Fire

Havelock, Aug. 26.—One of the worst fires in the history of this town started here at 4 o'clock this morning, the supposed cause being a bonfire in the rear of V. A. Coons' general store.

Toronto, Aug. 26.—The appointment is announced this morning of L. J. Ferritor, of Peru, Indiana, to be general superintendent of the G. T. R., replacing Mr. W. G. Brownlee. The supposition is that Mr. Brownlee is to be appointed assistant to General Manager F. W. Morse, of the G. T. P.

CARRYING EXPLOSIVES.

Ottawa, Aug. 26.—The board of railway commissioners have asked various interested parties to appear in regard to the carrying of explosives on railways, a subject for consideration of the next sitting at Ottawa. This arises out of the Essex explosion, and the fact that there are practically no regulations in Canada as to the traffic in dangerous elements. Some rules will be framed after consideration.

M. F. H. ANDREWS DEAD.

Quebec, Aug. 26.—M. F. H. Andrews, head of the firm of F. H. Andrews & Sons, commission merchants, died this morning. He was one of Quebec's most progressive businessmen. Mr. Andrews had been sick but a couple of weeks.

FINAL CURTAIN FOR TONY PASTOR

Famous New York Manager and Comic Singer Dead in His 71st Year.

New York, Aug. 26.—Antony ("Tony") Pastor, the theatrical manager, died at his home at Elmhurst, Long Island, at 10:05 o'clock tonight after an illness of several weeks, at the age of 71 years. The members of his immediate family were at his bedside.

Tony Pastor was one of the best known theatrical managers in the country. He was born in New York in 1837, and made his first appearance on the stage with a minstrel troupe at the age of nine years.

A few years later he became a clown and for fifteen years he was painted-face tumaker in the circus ring. But it was as a comic singer that Tony Pastor made his greatest successes.

He commenced his career as a singer of comic songs in 1861 and was so successful that in four years he had amassed enough money to get control of a music hall.

LABOR IS ACTIVE FOR DEMOCRATS

Gompers Announces That Federation Will Endeavor to Elect Bryan.

Washington, Aug. 26.—Following a conference between Democratic National Chairman Mack and Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, it was announced that Mr. Mack had approved the plans devised by Mr. Gompers and his associates to aid in Mr. Bryan's election, and that within a few days he would announce the chairman of the various labor bureaus which will be established in several of the larger cities, and conducted under the general direction of the national committee and the American Federation of Labor.

"The Democratic national convention will receive the co-operation of the American Federation of Labor in every way," said Mr. Mack, "and Mr. Gompers tonight submitted to me the plans which have been formulated to effect an active campaign in the labor world in the interest of Democracy."

CROTHERS NOMINATED BY WEST ELGIN CONS.

Dutton, Aug. 26.—West Elgin Conservatives met here today, and nominated Mr. T. W. Crothers, K.C., of St. Thomas, for the Commons.

Mr. Jackson, the present member, wished to retire from public life, so Mr. Crothers was nominated.

Resolutions were passed renewing the fealty of the meeting in the leaders of the party, and congratulating them on the work they have accomplished and sacrifices made for the good of the country.

The association elected the officers for the year as follows: President, ex-Mayor F. W. Wright, St. Thomas; vice-president, Edward McKellar, Dunwich; secretary, H. T. Gough, St. Thomas; chairman for St. Thomas, George W. Smiley.

FERDIE FORGIVEN

His "Affinity" Wife Will Try to Forget That Beating.

Monroe, N. Y., Aug. 26.—The trouble between Ferdinand Piney Earle and his "soul mate" wife, Julia Kutner Earle, which landed the artist in jail on a charge of wife-beating, gave promise today of an early adjustment.

Both Earle and his wife are said to be desirous of a reconciliation, and it is not believed Mrs. Earle will consent to appear in court to press the charge on which he is held.

Earle, himself, who at first appeared to be opposed to any movement having for its object his release from jail, was said to be in a different mood today. He passed a sleepless night in the jail at Goshen, and was constantly watched by guards who feared he would attempt to end his life. Today he broke down completely, wept, and declared that he would attempt to gain his wife's forgiveness.

The C. P. R. has ordered \$5,000 tons of 85 pound rails from the Soo mills.

The Quebec bridge board of engineers will meet on Monday to lay plans. The first sod has been turned for the building of an ozone filtering plant at Lindsay.

Geo. A. Clare, M. P., has been re-nominated as Conservative candidate in South Waterloo.

The Dominion liner Kensington ran down a large sperm whale near Newfoundland and cut it in two.

Police Captain Cameron, of Glasgow, who is at Montreal on a visit, was robbed of \$200 by pickpockets.

Harold MacKay, son of a leading Winnipeg merchant, was killed by the accidental discharge of a gun.

Martin Malone, acting for a ratepayer, is taking proceedings to oust the Hamilton street railway bylaw.

Inquiry is to be held into the death of Mary Carriere, a pretty girl, aged 20, who died suddenly at Espanola.

Four river drivers were upset from their canoe near Port Alexander, north of Winnipeg, and J. Houston and A. B. Knight drowned.

Joseph Bittel, charged with assaulting a Montreal constable, was acquitted on the ground that the constable had used his baton first.

Alf. W. Smithers, vice-president of the Grand Trunk, is coming over from England to inspect the road in place of Sir Charles Rivers Wilson.

At the American Health Association at Winnipeg, Dr. C. A. Hodgetts said there had been only 147 suicides in Canada in a decade—a remarkably low figure.

The G. T. P. is cancelling contract with the Electric Construction Company for the building of the 150 miles of the Abitibi section, owing to delay in completing the work.

Before the magistrate at Nanapan, Edward Randall pleaded guilty to absconding with funds belonging to the Bay of Quinte Railway and was sentenced to six months.

MAY YET SAVE PENSIONS

C. P. R. Gives Men Another Chance To Return.

Montreal, Aug. 26.—The report from Toronto that the locomotive engineers, firemen, conductors and trainmen are meeting here to consider action in connection with the C. P. R. strike is no confirmation. There is no meeting today, and officers of these unions say that there is to be none.

The C. P. R. took on 60 men today for the shops, making a total engaged since the beginning here of 1,500. The men's dress was made in G. P. west to Fernie district and clear up the first burnt area.

warehouses, which exploded. The fire department was unable to render any assistance on account of the high water.

Two white persons and one negro have been reported drowned. It was also reported that a boat containing a family of husband, wife and two children, was capsized, and all drowned, but this could not be confirmed.

A conservative estimate of the damage by flood and fire at this time has placed it at half a million dollars, but it is believed this sum will be greatly exceeded before the flood waters subside.
