IMPOSING WELCOME

TO THE CZAR'S PARTY

One Hundred and Fifty British Warships Form Passage for Russian Royal Yacht.

Cowes, Aug. 2.—The Russian imperial yacht Standart, bringing the Emperor and the Empress from Cherbourg to Cowes on a visit to King Edward, anchored in the Cowes roadstead shortly before 1 o'clock today. Their majesties were given on official welcome, even more imposing than usually attends such occasions. Not only were King Edward and Queen Alexandra, the Prince and Princess of Wales, and a large gathering of other members of the royal family, present to meet their guests, but 150 of the pick of the British war fleet, dressed in flags from stem to stern and flying the Russian ensign, filled the anchorage allotted to the Standart.

The presence of the English foreign secretary, Sir Edward Grey, M. Iswolsky, the Russian minister of foreign affairs, and Count Von Benckendorff, the Russian ambassador to Great Britain, further emphasized the significance attached in the diplomatic world to this visit of the Russian Emperor to England.

The unusual welcome of this morning was arranged designedly for the double purpose of helping to strengthen the links in the chain binding Great Britain, France and Russia in a triple entente and to dissipate any ill-feeling engendered by the harsh denunciation of Emperor Nicholas and his methods, so frequently vented by the members of the labor party in and out of parliament since the coming of the Emperor was first announced. The function, however, was distinctly official in character, and so strongly were the spectators entrenched behind the cordon of steel walls that there was no chance for a popular demonstration either for or against Emperor Nicholas.

King Edward and Queen Alexandra went out on board the royal yacht Victoria and Albert, and met the Standart outside of Spithead. King Edward went over to the Standart and welcomed his guests and then escorted them to the Victoria and Albert, where luncheon was served. After this repast the two sovereigns reviewed the assembled fleet from the Victoria and Albert.

Foreign Minister Iswolsky today confirmed the reported intention of Emperor Nicholas of going to Italy and Turkey, but said these visits would not occur until the fall. Emperor Nicholas will go to these countries direct from the Crimea.

SPAIN HAS SEEN TURBULENT TIMES

Several Great Revolutions Have Torn the Country Asunder.

WAR ON UNITED STATES

Last Great Upheaval Resulted in Restoration of a Monarchy in 1875.

London, Aug. 2.—Spain has been second only to France in the turbulence of its history and the regularity with which wars and revolutions have stripped it of its royal and its territorial, and altered its form of government. The last great upheaval was that which resulted in three different forms of republic and a military dictatorship in the twenty years which preceded the restoration in 1875 of the monarchy with Alfonso XII. as king.

The Founding of the kingdom of Asturias dates back to the eighth century; that of Navarre to the ninth; Castile and Aragon were founded respectively in 1032 and 1035. The two last were united in 1492. Spain reached its greatest glory and power in the sixteenth century. The Hapsburgs ruled from 1516 to 1700, when the Bourbons succeeded them. The throne was given to Joseph Bonaparte in 1808, and the Peninsula War kept the kingdom in a state of ferment from that year till 1814.

The Peninsular War. Charles IV., a weak and ignorant ruler, was responsible for Napoleon's accession and the Peninsular War. His wife, Maria Louise of Naples, was in love with a brilliant young man named Manuel Godoy, and she prevailed on Charles to make Godoy prime minister and generalissimo of the army and navy. Godoy was beguiled by Napoleon, by a promise of princely honors for himself, to allow the French army to march through Spain to invade England's ally, Portugal. When it was too late the Spanish people awoke to the situation, and the Peninsular War ensued.

Charles abdicated at Napoleon's request, and his son, Ferdinand VII., was taken to France as a prisoner. In his absence a party of extremists met at Cadiz, and adopted a new constitution, which was altogether different from anything the country had had before. Ferdinand, who had fled to England, came back from France in 1814, but a revolution made him see things in another light in 1821.

Defeated His Subjects.

The triumph of the revolutionists was short-lived, however, for in 1823 Fernando enlisted the help of French arms, and administered a beating to his own impetuous subjects. When he died in 1833 he left behind him a wife and his infant daughter, Isabella, to preserve intact all the regal prerogatives. Maria found this harder to do than to say, because the people whom Fernando had persecuted had rallied to Don Carlos, who claimed the throne under the Salic law, and the queen regent found it difficult to maintain her position without their support.

Then followed a long civil war, in which Don Carlos' pretensions were disposed of, but the leaning of the queen were so at variance with the democratic views of the party which supported her that Spain was plunged into a period of turbulence, pronouncements and civil revolts which culminated in the successful revolution of 1868, and the flight of Isabel to France.

Adopted New Constitution.

Then followed the period described above, in which Spain tried a variety of forms of government. Alfonso XII., who was restored to the throne at the end of it all, was the only son of Isabel. A new moderate constitution was adopted, and still remains in force, for the most part. The years which have passed since then have been comparatively tranquil. Alfonso XII. died at the age of 28, and his widow, Maria Christina of Austria, became regent until her son, the present king, reached his majority.

The threatened secession of Cuba brought on the Spanish-American War in 1898, and Spain lost all that was left of her ancient western empire. To the nation as a whole this was a desirable freedom from a costly and undesirable burden, but the loss of the colonies dislocated certain manufacturing interests, especially in Catalonia. This accounts for the fact that the separatist tendency has always remained strong among the Catalans.

Barcelona Isolated.

Paris, Aug. 2.—Judging from the reports reaching here, the situation in Barcelona still remains somewhat shrouded, as no correspondent yet has reached the city which is isolated by land and sea. The censored reports coming out of Madrid are suggestive of being over-optimistic. Nevertheless, it appears certain that General Santiago has succeeded in restoring a semblance of order in the city, and today a serious effort to resume work will be made. At the solicitation of the authorities, the employers of Barcelona have agreed to offer a premium of a week's wages to all who return to work.

At what cost in life and property comparative tranquility has been restored in Barcelona, however, still remains unknown. The various reports agree that the troops, aided with machine guns, drove the revolutionists back. The main body of the mob escaped and took refuge behind the barricades in the workmen's quarter, from which they were finally expelled by shells from the guns on Fort Montjuic. Refugees arriving at the frontier speak of the terrific slaughter, and estimate the dead at thousands, but allowances must be made for their panic. Whether or not the ringleaders who were captured and tried and condemned by court martial actually have been executed, is not yet clear. Some reports declare that General Santiago has not yet approved the death sentences in the cases of these men. It is known, however, that Emiliano Iz-

lesias, editor of The Progreso, was shot without trial in the fortress. But if order has been restored in Barcelona, it seems equally certain that the country, especially the district north of the city, still is in the hands of the revolutionaries, and the task of reducing the remainder of the province probably will entail much additional fighting and bloodshed. Even the official dispatches from Madrid speak of the necessity of restoring order in the interior of the province, and the difficulty of dislodging the "anarchists," who have taken refuge in the mountains. Some reports insist that a republic already has been proclaimed, and that a regular junta is directing the operations of the revolutionists.

LAST HONORS PAID TO DEAD EX-MINISTER

Impressive Funeral Ceremonies at Interment of Late Hon. John Dryden.

Toronto, Aug. 2.—The mortal remains of the late Hon. John Dryden were yesterday consigned to their last resting place in the cemetery close to the north end of Maple Shade farm, near Brooklin, amid many tokens of grief and esteem. To the old home-stand the burial casket was taken on Saturday evening after the close of the private service at Prince Arthur avenue, his Toronto residence. There were present on Saturday, in addition to Mrs. Dryden, her children: W. A. Dryden of Brooklin, Mrs. C. L. Starr of Toronto, Mrs. W. W. McMaster of St. John, N.B., Mrs. J. Sycamore of Hamilton, Mrs. E. Matthews of Chatham, and Mrs. E. J. Zavitz of Guelph, representatives of the principal church and political associations with which Mr. Dryden had been connected. Among those who thus honored his memory were: Premier Sir James Whitney, Hon. J. J. Fox, attorney-general; Hon. G. W. Ross, premier of Ontario; during Mr. Dryden's term of office as minister of agriculture; W. A. Charlton; President G. C. Creelman of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph; Prof. G. J. Gavitz, also of the Ontario Agricultural College; Prof. J. H. Holman, K.C.; Dr. Clarence L. Starr, Rev. J. C. Sycamore of Hamilton, Dr. Witherspoon of Alkirk, Rev. Wm. Gregory, Mr. A. F. MacLaren of Stratford, Messrs. W. J. Robertson, H. L. Stark, John Stark, E. A. Hardy and others. The service was conducted by Rev. W. A. Cameron, pastor of Bloor Street Baptist Church, where for many years Mr. Dryden had been a regular attendant, and he was assisted in it by Rev. C. S. Edwards. In an impressive address Mr. Cameron eulogized the high standard of conduct which had governed Mr. Dryden alike in his public career and his domestic and church life.

At the Old Homestead.

The scene at the Maple Shade farm yesterday afternoon, when the former master of the place was awaiting the short journey to the cemetery, was an impressive one. The day was exceptionally fine, and the crowd on the grounds in front of the house was very large. Not fewer than two thousand people must have passed the open casket on the lawn to take a last look at the dead farmer-statesman, whose life from childhood up had been spent among them, and at the same time another thousand had gathered in the cemetery to await the arrival of the funeral cortege there.

INCREASE IN REVENUE

The Customs Returns for July Show Large Gains.

Ottawa, Aug. 2.—The customs receipts of the Dominion for July indicate a continued rapid growth in imports and a return of the record conditions of frontier trade in goods and revenue. For the month just ended the receipts from the customs totalled \$1,913,156, an increase of \$1,180,279 over July of last year, and a figure set in July, 1907.

For the first quarter of the fiscal year the customs revenue has been \$18,003,143, an increase of \$3,544,408. Indications point to a total increase in the Dominion revenue of from ten to twenty millions during the current fiscal year.

MARVELLOUS ESCAPE

Would-Be Suicide Saved Despite Himself.

Margate, Aug. 2.—A man's marvelous escape from death was described to the Chestnut magistrates when Charles Stephen Brown of Margate, charged with attempted suicide by endeavoring to throw himself under a train on the Great Eastern Railway at Broxbourne.

A porter saw the accused rush on to the embankment just as a goods train approached. Catching his feet in some telegraph wires, he fell with his head within three inches of the rails. He struggled violently to disentangle his feet, and made frantic efforts to place his head on the line. He succeeded in so doing, but was struck on the crown of his head by a projection from one of the trucks, and before he recovered himself the train had passed by.

ROBT. SCARLETT DEAD.

Toronto, Aug. 2.—Robert A. Scarlett, prominent grain merchant and member of the board of trade, died today after a few weeks' illness.

DONS WERE BRAVE BUT HOPELESSLY TRAPPED

The Moors Poured Volleys Into Spaniards Caught in a Narrow Gorge.

Oran, Algeria, Aug. 2.—The steamer Emir came in here today from Meilla and her officers, referring to the fighting between the Spaniards and the Moors of July 27, say the former made the mistake of advancing in solid masses through a gorge dominated on both sides by hills whence the enemy moved them down as fast as they issued from the pass. The unfortunate soldiers of Spain did not know where the fusillades came from. The butchery was terrible. Many of the Spaniards had only just disembarked and were without rifles.

Further particulars received regarding the situation at Meilla say the arrangements for caring for the wounded are most deplorable. There are but few doctors on the scene, and medicines, surgical instruments and other appliances are almost entirely lacking. During the fighting of July 27 the staff of General Marina, the commander of the Spanish forces, was decimated and some companies lost half their strength and three-quarters of their officers. All the reports speak of the bravery of the men and officers, but dwell upon the stupidity of the antiquated tactics employed and the disorganization of the commissariat.

LUK WING A MASON

Murdered Consul Only Chinese Member of the Order.

New York, Aug. 2.—Wong Bow Cheung, as he has been identified, the Americanized Chinese cook, who shot and killed his vice-consul, Luk Wing, yesterday afternoon, was arraigned before the coroner today, and committed to the Tombs without bail, to await the result of the inquest to be held on Wednesday.

Wong has the reputation in Chinatown of being a hard drinker, and chronically in want of cash. Dr. Luk Wing's funeral will be held in the chapel of an undertaking establishment, Wednesday evening, under Masonic auspices.

Wing was the only Chinese in the State of New York holding membership in a regular Masonic lodge.

Wednesday the body will be taken to Washington, Conn., and interred in the burial plot of the late Mrs. Julia Leichardt, a wealthy and philanthropic woman, who became interested in the Chinese diplomat when he first came to America as a child.

A British Boat From Sydney to London Has Failed to Report

Durban, Aug. 2.—Three thousand persons are aboard the British steamer Waratah, en route from Sydney to London, and failure to hear any report of the vessel since she sailed, July 26, has resulted in some alarm. Search is being made for the steamer.

THE CHINESE FLOODS.

Tokio, Aug. 2.—Further advices received here regarding the flood situation in the province of Chang Chun, Manchuria, are to the effect that owing to the damage done by water traffic on the Antung the Mukden railway has been tied up completely for fifty days. According to previous dispatches 1,000 lives were lost in the city of Kirin and houses were submerged.

U. S. DEBT JULY 31 WAS \$917,530,857

Michigan Stands Twelfth in Amount of Money Turned Into Treasury.

Washington, Aug. 3.—At the close of business July 31, 1909, the monthly statement of the public debt shows that the debt, less cash in the treasury, amounted to \$917,530,857.

The interest-bearing debt is \$913,317,490; debt on which interest has ceased since maturity, \$2,814,475; debt bearing no interest, \$380,417,144; total \$1,296,549,110. This does not include, however, \$1,343,211,869 in certificates and treasury notes outstanding which are offset by an equal amount of cash held in the treasury for their redemption.

The cash in the treasury is classified as follows: Gold reserve \$150,000,000; trust funds, \$1,343,211,869; general fund, \$169,094,234; in National Bank depositaries, \$41,622,746; in Philippine treasury, \$52,127,272; against which there are demand liabilities outstanding of \$1,343,211,869, which leaves a cash balance on hand of \$258,437,755.

The total receipts for July were \$57,577,081; and the total disbursements were \$76,681,020. This is exclusive of postal revenues and disbursements, except postal deficiency and gives an excess of \$649,898 of ordinary receipts over ordinary disbursements.

Michigan is the twelfth state in the union in the amount of internal revenue collected during the last fiscal year. The state turned into the federal treasury during the twelve months \$3,281,314, all of this being collected at Detroit with the exception of \$799,815, which was collected at Grand Rapids.
