

COURT OF REVISION CONCLUDES ITS WORK

Reductions Made Totalling the
Sum of \$62,663.

The court of revision has finished its work for the year. The net reductions amount to \$46,823, a comparatively small sum indeed, in view of the fact that the increase in assessment totals over a million and a half.

The total reductions amounted to \$62,663. The increases amount to \$15,840, making the net reduction \$46,823, as mentioned above.

The greatest reduction was in No. 1 Ward. It totalled \$44,064, divided as follows: Real estate, \$20,539; business, \$14,935; income, \$8,587; statute labor, \$2.

Ward No. 2 stands next with a total of \$11,222, of which the real estate furnished \$1,409; business, \$6,327; income, \$3,496.

Ward No. 3 showed a reduction of \$2,377 and Ward No. 4, \$4,989. The increases were in Wards 1 and 2 and altogether in business assessment. In the First Ward, \$14,615 was added to the business assessment and \$850 to the income assessment. In Ward 2, \$375 was added to business assessment.

AGAIN ARRESTED

Harry Woods Released Was Immediately Taken on Another Charge.

Toronto, Nov. 5.—Henry (Reddy) Woods was arrested before Police from the Central Prison this morning after serving a six months term on two convictions of ninety days each, one for theft and the other for bigamy only to be at once arrested on a warrant from Woodstock charging him with theft of \$20 and some clothing. Woods was arrested before Police Magistrate Denison and remanded to await the arrival of an officer from Woodstock.

TROUBLES ARE ENDED

Head Engineer Van Cleave, Manager of the City and London Electric Company, Saturday went over the power lines on Hamilton road, and they arrived at a settlement of the difficulties.
The matter will be referred to Chairman Pockock and City Solicitor Meredith, and will be adjusted by them.
There is not much danger of difficulty now, and the high tension will be ready very shortly.

"Everything is going along smoothly now," said Chairman Pockock. "Our construction work is well advanced, and it will not be long before we are ready for the power."

DISMISSED CHARGE

FEODORENKO'S CASE

Local Russians Are Keenly Interested in Winnipeg Charge.

A great deal of interest is being taken by the local Russian Jewish colony in the fate of Feodorenko, the Russian Jew, under arrest in Winnipeg at the instance of the Russian Government. The man's extradition is desired by the Russians on the ground that he is a revolutionist.
Collections have been taken in every city in Canada, and many in the United States on his behalf. Local Jews have been raising money, and a great deal of interest has been fostered.

A mass meeting will be held in the near future, which will be addressed by Mr. W. H. Hoop, of Winnipeg, one of the gentlemen deeply interested in the case.

CRIME ON INCREASE

Comparison of Statistics for the Several Provinces.

Ottawa, Nov. 5.—The annual report of the Minister of Justice shows that crime, like everything else in Canada, is on the increase, though apparently the growth is much slower than in other and better things. There were 15,359 charges and 11,449 convictions for indictable offences during the year ended Sept. 30, 1909, an increase of 110 charges and 115 convictions during the year. Both charges and convictions have increased during the year in Prince Edward Island, Saskatchewan and Alberta, while they have decreased in New Brunswick, Quebec, Manitoba and British Columbia; as for Ontario and the Yukon, the figures show an increase in charges and an increase in convictions; whereas in Nova Scotia the charges are higher and convictions lower in 1909 than they were the year before. The percentage of acquittals for 1909 is lower than the general average in New Brunswick, Quebec, Manitoba, British Columbia and the Yukon, and higher in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, Saskatchewan, and Alberta.

In proportion to population, the share of criminality is lower in the Maritime Provinces and Quebec than elsewhere, while it is highest in British Columbia and the Yukon. Throughout Canada there were 42 charges and 18 convictions for murder; attempted murder, 28 charges and 14 convictions; manslaughter, 36 charges and 24 convictions.

Of the 42 charges for murder, 15 were tried in Ontario, 11 in British Columbia, 1 in New Brunswick, 3 each in Manitoba and Alberta, 2 each in Quebec and Saskatchewan and 1 in Nova Scotia. There were 7,404 charges of theft and 5,761 convictions, and 1,132 charges of burglary and highway robbery, with 848 convictions. There were 274 convictions for perjury and 9 convictions for usury. There were 711 pardons granted, including 573 tickets-of-leave.

LUNATICS AT LARGE

Thirty Escaped When Brandon Asylum Was Destroyed by Fire.

Brandon, Man., Nov. 6.—A great heap of smouldering ruins is all that remains of the Hospital for the Insane, which was destroyed by fire on Friday night.

Despite the vigilance of the guards, thirty of the insane people got away. The majority were men and not dangerous. With great forethought the assistants had taken great care to secure all the keys and one among the lunatics. Some were quickly hurried to jail and others to police cells. During the night the city police picked up several stragglers around the streets of the city.

Officials declare that everybody in the building escaped.

Insurance on the Hospital for the Insane amounted to nearly \$350,000, and it is understood that a large amount of this was carried by three Brandon companies. The great conflagration was started by a live wire in the top story of the centre building.

It is now stated that Manitoba will be relieved of the care of hundreds of the homeless lunatics on the completion of the Alberta asylum at Ponoka. The great majority of the inmates of the Brandon asylum are from Saskatchewan and Alberta, and they will be sent to Ponoka within a few weeks.

The asylum at that place will be completed by the first of the year, but it is expected a portion will be rushed to completion to provide accommodation and relieve the situation here.

GREAT AUTO TRIP

Army Officers Plan To Go From Cape to Cairo.

Berlin, Nov. 5.—An expedition that resembles many ways the trip of Lieut. Grant, who two years ago made his way across Africa from east to west by motor car, is about to be attempted by two young Germans. They are Lieut. Schmeider of the Artillery Guards, and Dr. Ludwig Muller, a young scientist, and instead of travelling in the direction taken by their predecessor they will try to make their way from the Cape to Cairo.

The expedition is under the patronage of the crown prince and is well equipped for emergencies. The men start in February and take with them a motor car which has been specially built for the trip. Besides being planned for rough going it is so arranged that the two passengers will be able to camp out and sleep in it.

The men will follow the line of the Cape-to-Cairo Railway and will make special investigations, with the object of establishing a number of motor services in the regions adjacent to it. Scientific experiments will be made in German East Africa, including some wireless telegraph tests.

KILLED BY FALL

One Dead and Two Injured When Ladder Broke.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Nov. 6.—One man dead and two seriously injured is the result of the collapse of a ladder at the Ontario Power Company's new works below the bank this morning.

Three workmen employed as riggers were climbing the ladder together, the first being Benjamin Phillips, who was followed by William Dushney, then Richard Mizener. When the men were up about 35 feet one of the uprights of the ladder gave way and all three men were precipitated to the rocky floor in a heap.

When help reached the unfortunate men it was supposed all three were dead until they got them extricated, and the bodies of the two men were skinned and crushed in, and the other two men were hurried off to the hospital. Dushney died as he was carried into the building.

It was found that Phillips had received severe scalp wounds, general contusions and cuts about the body and limbs; also slight internal injuries.

Dushney formerly kept the Queen's Park Hotel. He leaves a widow and three small children.

OIL TRUST MAKES \$9,000,000 DEAL

Standard Company Secures Immensely Rich Properties in Louisiana.

Pittsburg, Nov. 5.—It was announced here today that the Standard Oil Company had taken over the holdings of the J. C. Trees Oil Company, of this city, at Caddo Parish, Louisiana, paying \$9,000,000. The oil fields comprise 104,000 acres about 25 miles north of Shreveport. The deal was closed by the Standard Oil Company's offices, 26 Broadway, New York, yesterday. George J. Wolf represented the Trees Oil Company, and J. C. Donnell, president of the Ohio Oil Company, of Findlay, represented the Standard.

The Louisiana field produces a high grade of oil and the daily production is said to be about 12,000 barrels. This is said to be the largest deal in oil lands in the history of the industry.

SUFFRAGETTES THREATEN

Women May Make More Spectacular Attacks on Parliament.

London, Nov. 5.—The suffragettes have again become active, their immediate object being to secure the passage during the autumn session of the Conciliation Bill bestowing the parliamentary vote on those women who at present have a vote at municipal elections, and which passed through the initial stages during the spring session.

The women have been very busy in recent by-elections and have been carrying on a general campaign against the Government throughout the country. As a climax a suffrage demonstration week, beginning Nov. 7, has been arranged for London, with a view to trying to convince the Government members of parliament of the earnestness of all suffragettes in their determination that the bill shall be allowed to go through its further stages. All societies that advocate women's suffrage have been invited to co-operate, and each will hold a public meeting leading up to a joint demonstration in Albert Hall Saturday, Nov. 12.

When parliament reassembles Nov. 15, the women will become even more active, and have threatened, unless the premier engages his mind and gives facilities for the bill, to make a number of their spectacular attacks on the houses of parliament.

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CHEWING GUM ACCIDENT.

Pittsburg, Nov. 5.—Clyde Kinsey, right halfback of the West Virginia University team, went into convulsions and almost choked to death this afternoon on Forbes field. During a scrimmage he felled with the ball, and having a wad of chewing gum in his mouth he partly swallowed it. The gum stuck in his windpipe and he was carried from the field to the Mercy Hospital in what was thought to be a dying condition. He recovered after he arrived at the hospital, and later left for his home at Morgantown, W. Va.
