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ROUT OF THE SUFFRAGETTES
BY THE BOBBIES OF LONDON

Militant Section Attempt to Storm the Commons But Are Frustrated and Resort to Window Smashing—Two Hundred and Twenty Three Placed Under Arrest.

London, Nov. 21.—The militant section of the Suffragettes have not been long in making good their promise to re-begin their old tactics. They warned Premier Asquith of this last week, and tonight between 8 and 11 o'clock some two hundred militant women, dressed in black, marched tenderly by busy London streets to the neighborhood of the House of Commons. They made a fine demonstration, but it suffered in comparison with their earlier efforts.

The programme, which was announced well beforehand, was that the women assemble at their headquarters in Caxton Hall, march to Westminster, and make demonstrations against their den, and make demonstrations against the House of Commons. They gathered in Caxton Hall in goodly numbers, but fewer than on previous occasions, and speeches were vigorously made, but the Government's manhood suffrage bill as an insult to women. Resolutions were adopted demanding equal franchise. Then the chosen deputation marched forth to storm the House of Commons. A large force of police immediately broke the force of police, the members of which made their way by two and three to Parliament Square. Here, and at all the approaches to the Parliament Buildings, several thousand people had gathered to see the force of police, probably a couple of thousands, who effectively preserved the precincts of Parliament from the slightest desecration.

A solid smiling crowd surrounded the buildings, held every approach, kept the crowd moving and invested the whole proceeding with a sense of good-natured, smiling discipline. So long as they kept moving, onlookers might go everywhere through the crowd, which guarded the Parliament Buildings. Wheeled traffic was impeded, but not stopped anywhere. Whereas the crowds during the previous Suffragette attacks on the House of Commons were so enormous that all traffic in the vicinity of Parliament Square was diverted, tonight the crowds, which passed through easily, if slowly.

The Suffragettes, except in force, could not make a very imposing show. The usual method of securing arrest was for two or three to run up against a solid line of bobbies, who would gently push them back into the laughing crowd. It was enough, it would secure an arrest. Three policemen would be brought out from the reserves. The Suffragettes would take the Suffragettes to the police station, mounted policemen making a way for them through the crowd. In this manner three Suffragettes, including three men, were taken to the police stations.

There was one feature of this demonstration, namely, window smashing. This was not done by the hooligans in the crowd, which was chiefly composed of respectable men and women, but by flying squadrons of Suffragettes, who, in a "daring service," the object being apparently to draw the attention of the police from the House of Commons.

The demonstration was not so large as those of last year. The damage to property was greater than
