He Charges That Mr. Glaubitz Would Dismiss Department's Employees at Any Time at the Direction of Hon. Adam Beck.

Superintendent Glaubitz announced to the water commissioners yesterday that he would not remain with the city unless given Capt. T. J. Murphy Optimistic Coal Company, formally made an ofabsolute control over both the water and electrical departments. The statement was made following criticisms of his plan of reorganization. The commissioners laid the matter over, and definite action will not be taken until the next meeting.

Mr. Glaubitz submitted blue prints showing the plan of reorganization he had prepared. Under the scheme he was to be known as general manager, not superintendent.


