JOURNALIST'S DEATH CONTAINS A MYSTERY

Well-Known London Writer Is Found Dead In Her Dressing Room.

[Canadian Press.] London, Feb. 13.—Elements of mystery surround the death last evening of Mrs. Buttenshaw, a well-known journalist, who shot herself in her dressing-room while she was speaking over the telephone, and died almost immediately. She lived alone, and kept a revolver on her dressing table, on which also stood the telephone apparatus. One suggestion is that while she was engaged in a telephone conversation she was trying the weapon and unconsciously pressed the trigger. Mrs. Buttenshaw was heard to call out immediately after the report of the revolver, "For God's sake, come; burst the door open."

LIBERAL FIGHT FOR THE NORTH COMPELS WHITNEY TO ACT

Ontario Government Will Ask Authority to Borrow Five Millions of Dollars In Order to Develop New Ontario; the Work To Be Placed Under a New Department.

Toronto, Feb. 13.—According to the pressure of the Opposition and the call from Northern Ontario, cognizant of the protests from the boards of trade in the province, and the secession movement in the northwestern districts, Sir James Whitney announced in the Legislature yesterday afternoon that the Government would ask authority to borrow \$5,000,000 to be spent on the development and colonization of the provincial hinterland, and the appointment of a man of experience and capacity to handle this department of the work. Sir James made this announcement after the routine proceedings of the afternoon were completed, and it came as a great surprise to the members of the House, and when the Prime Minister concluded his remarks he was greeted with loud Government applause.

Leader Rowell. Mr. N. W. Rowell, the Liberal leader, was quick to take advantage of the situation. "I congratulate the Prime Minister," he said, "on making this announcement. The only question which arises is whether the proposals are adequate to meet the situation. I am glad to see that our campaign for New Ontario development is having effect." (Liberal cheers.) Mr. Allan Studholme (East Hamilton), said he had been urging such a step on the Government since 1907. The boards of trade of Toronto and all over the province had taken the matter up and were protesting against the inaction of the Government. "What was ridiculed in 1907 is brought forward today. I am pleased he is going into the matter. The Premier can have all the credit he wants."

A New Department. The man to be placed in charge of the work of developing the north country will not be the head of a new department of Government. It is understood that he will assume the position of a deputy minister in one of the existing departments. Just what the duties of the new appointment will have not been clearly defined, but he will, it is stated, be given wide powers. He will have charge of the construction of all necessary roads in the north country other than colonization roads, which form shadows of a policy of going into the townships and opening them up before the arrival of the settler, a policy that the northwesterners have been persistently advocating. FARMERS' BANK INVESTIGATION BY SIR WILLIAM MEREDITH

A One-Man Commission To Look Into the Affairs of the Bank.

Ottawa, Feb. 12.—Sir William R. Meredith will be the commissioner who will inquire into the affairs of the Farmers' Bank. As already stated, it will be a one-man commission. The powers granted under the order-in-council establishing the commission are wide enough to provide for a thorough revelation of all the transactions of the Farmers' Bank, commencing from the earliest stages of the institution. It is expected that the inquiry will begin immediately, and will cover the ground already partially covered in the Toronto investigation, but it will go beyond the facts of the bank's affairs. It is not expected that the report of the commission will be ready for Parliament at the present session.

EXPRESS NIGHT CLERK PLACED UNDER ARREST

Police Make Unexpected Move in Connection With the Big Steal at Hamilton.

[Canadian Press.] Hamilton, Feb. 12.—George Kennough, night clerk in the Canadian Express Company's head office here, on the night of the sensational robbery of \$5,500, from one of the safes, was placed under arrest at noon today, charged with conspiracy. Kennough is the man who told the story about the masked men shattering the glass in one of the doors and holding him up at a revolver's point, while they gagged and bound him, and later got away with the money package. He was placed under arrest. The police, however, dropped the original charge, prosecuted him for the theft of a trifling amount which he had collected and failed to return, and he got three months.

The next move was the arrest of J. D. Chilton and Joseph Acheson, two well-known young businessmen, Acheson was acquitted, and Chilton given a year on the charge of stealing. The case is being appealed. The trial attracted much attention here on account of the prominence of the prisoners. There was much criticism, because Kennough was not arrested. The move the police made today explains their action in calling Kennough as a witness at the trial. Sentational developments are looked for when Kennough is placed on trial. His home is in Dundas. The outcome of his case will, of course, have an important bearing on the Chilton appeal.
