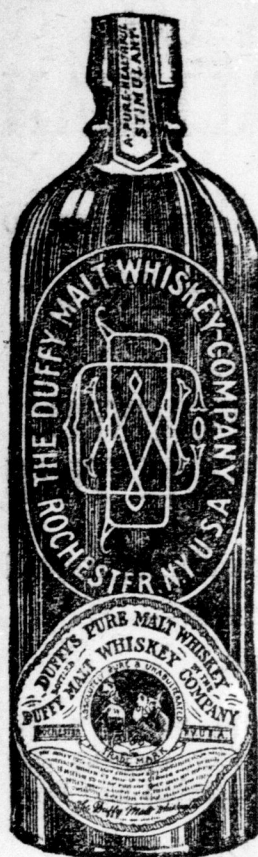

BRITAIN SAYS WAR SPOILS MUST GO TO THE VICTOR; LIMIT AREA OF CAMPAIGN

Premier Asquith Makes Important Announcement in Regard to the Great Powers and the Situation in the Balkans.

THE MARGIN OF SAFETY SQUADRON IS TO BE READY THIS YEAR

London, Nov. 10.—Seldom, even at a Mansion House banquet, have more momentous speeches been delivered by ministers of the crown than on Saturday evening, when the new lord mayor, David Burnett, was installed. Expectation was at fever height concerning the pronouncement of Premier Herbert H. Asquith regarding the Balkan situation.

"We are living in anxious times, and are spectators of great and moving events," he said. "The Balkan armies are in effective possession of Macedonia and Thrace. Saloniki, the gateway through which Christianity first entered Europe, is occupied by the Greeks, and we may any moment hear of the fall of Constantinople itself. It is a satisfaction to be able to assure you that so far as this country is concerned its relations with other powers, without a single exception, were never more friendly and cordial. POWERS UNITED.

"The great powers are working together with a closeness of touch and a frankness and freedom of communication and discussion which are remarkable, and which may seem almost unintelligible to those who believe that because for certain purposes the powers have been and are ranged in different groups, they must therefore, in a time of European crisis, be arrayed in opposite camps.

TRIED TO END WAR.

"The powers have been blamed in some quarters because they did not succeed in averting the war. They sought, and sought earnestly by diplomatic pressure and without resort to force, to secure conditions of order and good government in the European provinces of the Ottoman Empire."

Blocked by Balkans.

"But forces were at work beyond the control of any diplomatic manipulation. The Balkan States having matured their plans, perfected their equipment, and co-ordinated their reciprocal action, decided that force was the only effectual remedy, and that they, and they alone, were prepared to use it. They took the matter into their own hands. Things can never be again as they were; and it is the business of statesmen everywhere to recognize and accept the accomplished fact. When Pitt, mortally stricken by the news of Austerlitz, came home to die, he told those about him to roll up the map of Europe which hung on the wall. But even the campaign of Austerlitz did not produce changes so sudden and so startlingly and overwhelmingly complete as those which during the last month have been wrought by the Balkan confederacy. The map of Eastern Europe has been recast, and in the process it may be that ideas, preconceptions and policies which were born in what is now a bygone era will have to be modified, reconstructed, or even go altogether by the board. Upon one thing I believe the general opinion of Europe to be unanimous, namely, that the victors are not to be robbed of the fruits which cost them so dear.

No Direct Interest.

"So far as I know there is no disposition anywhere to belittle the magnitude of the struggle or to dispute the decisiveness of the result. We in this country have no direct interest in the exact form which consequent political and territorial redistribution may ultimately take. There are other powers whose special relations, geographical, economic, ethical and historical, with the scene of the conflict and its destination are such that they cannot be expected not to claim a hearing and a voice when the time comes for a permanent settlement. I purposely refrain at this stage from even indicating in the most general way the points, some of them full of difficulty, which must inevitably emerge for solution. New War Horrors

Constantinople, Nov. 10.—The outbreak of cholera is assuming serious proportions. Twenty-three cases had occurred among the troops along the Tschatalja line up to Wednesday. There are many more suspected cases among the wounded. A trainload of wounded has just reached here with the sight of the soldiers having died on the way, presumably from cholera. The disease is getting a firmer hold on account of the massing of troops, the lack of proper food and the complete absence of sanitary arrangements. The danger of Constantinople is great, on account of the influx of refugees. Already several suspected cases among the latter have been reported. The authorities are preparing a special quarantine hospital, with 400 beds, at Sirkeji. Telegrams from Salonica and Uskub are to the effect that virulent typhoid has developed among the soldiers, and there have been a great number of deaths.

"We had not proposed, last year, to create a sixth battleship squadron until 1915, but by various administrative arrangements it will be possible to bring that squadron into existence next year. When I say 'bring it into existence' I mean bringing it into existence fully manned on mobilization with active service rating. This will increase the 'margin of security' to which I have on several occasions referred in the House of Commons. 'No harm' has been done during the year by plain speaking on naval questions. On the contrary, the effect has been extremely good. The Germans are a nation with robust minds and a high sense of honor and fair play. They look at affairs in a practical military spirit; they like to have facts put squarely before them, and they do not want them wrapped up lest they should be shocked by them; and the relations between the two countries have steadily improved during the year. They have steadily improved side by side with every evidence of our determination to maintain our naval supremacy. The best way to make these arrangements thoroughly healthy and comfortable is to go right on and put an end to this naval rivalry by proving that we cannot be overtaken."

Army in Good Condition.

Col. J. B. Seely, the secretary of state for war, replying in behalf of the military forces, said that the outstanding feature of the year, he supposed, had been the creation of a royal flying corps. The numbers of the regular army had been fully maintained, and its efficiency was probably greater than at any time in history. Besides the regular army and national reserves, there remained that great citizen army, the second line in this country, and in the dominions overseas, and the crown says that they were growing in numbers greater than ever before. He did not mean to say that all was perfect. Far from it. Much remained to be done and great efforts must be made if the forces of the crown were to continue adequate to the immense responsibility pressed upon Great Britain. He also looked forward to the day when every man would follow up the same dictate of civic patriotism for which England was renowned, by saying: "I will extend civic patriotism to the duty of defending my country, and of my own free will I have done my part."

STRANDED LINER HAS BEEN ABANDONED

S. S. Royal George, on the Rocks Below Quebec. Has Been Turned Over to the Underwriters as a Protective Measure.

Toronto, Nov. 11.—The Canadian Northern Railway liner Royal George has been abandoned to the underwriters. The vessel is still in the same position on the rocks one mile east of Point St. Lawrence, and the owners, preparing for the worst, have notified the insurance companies that the vessel is now on their hands. The message was cabled to London yesterday by Vice-President D. B. Hanna, who has charge of the steamship department. Mr. Hanna stated to the press that it was not owing to his belief that the Royal George was badly damaged that the step was taken, but that the company were assuming the worst, and

that in such a case they had but taken the proper steps to protect both the underwriters and themselves. Mr. Hanna said that the Royal George was insured for \$1,275,000, but this amount would not cover the cost of replacing the lines. He placed the cost of it at between \$1,700,000 and \$2,000,000. Besides this loss, he said, the company would lose a great deal more from loss of traffic and other things, which could not be figured in dollars. The Canadian Northern, Mr. Hanna explained, however, were not abandoning the vessel completely, but would continue to make every effort to release it, and if it was considered that it was not too badly damaged to be repaired, would exert every facility to have it repaired immediately. In that case it would be taken out of the underwriters' hands.

C. J. BROOKE & C. DEAD For Many Years Was Prominent Member of Quebec Bar. [Canadian Press.] Ottawa, Nov. 9.—C. J. Brooke, K.C., of the legal firm of Brooke & Chauvin,

a daughter of the late Alexander Cameron, M.D., M. P. P., Huntingdon, Que. He began the practice of law at Montreal, becoming an advocate in 1879. In 1910 he was made barrister of Ottawa County, and re-elected in 1911. His wife, two sons, and a daughter survive him.
