New War Horrors

Constantinople, Nov. 10.—The outbreak of cholera is assuming serious proportions. Twentythree cases had occurred among the troops along the Tchatald-ja lines up to Wednesday. There are many more suspected cases among the wounded. A trainload of wounded has just reached here, with eight of the soldiers having died on the way, presumably from cholera.

The disease is getting a firmer hold on account of the massing of troops, the lack of proper food and the complete absence of sanitary, arrangements. The danger of Constantinople is great, on account of the influx of refugees. 
