CASE OF CRUELTY

Society Will Assist the Police in Prosecution on Tuesday Next-The Funds on Hand,

The Humane Society held its regular meeting Friday night in the board of trade rooms, the president, Col. Gartshore, presiding.

Secretary W. L. Steeves reported the work of the society since its last meeting on July 2. One especial case which required the attention of the society occurred on Thursday, and a sequel in the police court is yet to follow. Henry Hamilin, of Lambeth, is the owner of four horses, three of which are suffering from severe sores about the neck, and lame shoulders. Their present condition is pitiable, and they are absolutely unfit for work. The police are taking a hand in the matter and are prosecuting the owner on one charge, while the Humane Society is using the law in another. Mr. Hamilin appears in the police court on Tuesday next to answer these

Cruelty to Fowl.
Several cases of alleged cruelty
were reported in regard to the inhuman custom which many people have of carrying live fowl by the feet and having their heads dangling and strik-ing the pavements, while the birds are squawking painfully. Several cases of this type are to be seen daily on the

Another custom is the boxing of fowl in airtight cases at the market and at the stations. The society are going to, and all citizens who have sympathy for dumb creatures, should work for the suppression of this inhuman traffic. Insanitary Fountains.
