Canadian Trade

[Canadian Press.] Ottawa, Aug. 26.—The customs department statement for July and the first four months of the current fiscal year, indicates a most striking growth in Canadian trade. Total trade for July was \$100,357,000 as against \$91,423,000 in July last year.

For the four months trade totalled \$358,488,00, compared with \$320,635,-000 in the same period of 1912.

The duty collected in the four months was \$38,531,000, as against \$35,990,000 in the corresponding period last year. The imports for July are given as \$58,928,000, and exports of Canadian products \$33,660,000. For the four months imports were produce \$117,180,000.


