Fifty One Now in Federation of Ontario, Supplying Speakers for Meetings.

Toronto, April 13 .- The second annual business meeting of the Liberal Club Federation of Ontario was held today. The principal suggestion came from the retiring president, W. B. Preston, Brantford, who advanced the proposal of a speakers' committee beng formed among the members of the Federation, to make arrangements for the province from one end to the other being visited by the capable and effective young advocates of Liberalism. The proposal was heartily indorsed by he meeting.

Mr. Preston stated that while there vere only 24 clubs originally in the scheme, they were able now to an-nounce that the number had been augmented and there were 51 active clubs in this federation.
