NEWS

Place of Meeting Changed.—The Union Mothers' Club will meet at Talbot street school this (Friday) evening, instead of at Alexandra school, as previously announced.

E. J. Webster Attending Convention.—E. J. Webster of this city, president of the Canadian Retail Coal Association is in Toronto attending the tenth annual convention of the association which opened there yesterday.

Seek Better Illumination.—The city today notified the Grand Trunk Railway that the crossings in the city would have to be equipped with better illumination. The recommendation was made by a special committee some time ago.

Massey-Harris Car.—The special car "Ceres," en route from Toronto to Los Angeles with Massey-Harris exhibits, passed through London yesterday, on Grand Trunk train No. 13, bound for Chicago.

King Street Pavement.—The complaint by residents of King street for a better pavement will go to the city solicitor for an opinion. Payments on the present pavement has two years to run, but it is in bad shape in certain sections.

To Conduct Dedication Services.—Major Frank Morris, of the Salvation Army headquarters staff here, will conduct dedication services in the South London City Hall at eleven o'clock Sunday morning.

South Huron Excursion.—The S. Huron farmers' excursion to Guelph will be held Tuesday, June 22, via the Grand Trunk Railway. The excursion train will start at Centralia and pick up passengers along the line. The trip will be made via Clinton and Stratford.

Out For Fish.—A party of fishermen left London on a special car via the Grand Trunk at six o'clock this morning bound for Windsor, from where they will proceed to Snake Island. The party numbered about fifteen. They will be absent a week.

Port Stanley Picnic Saturday.—The employees of D. S. Perrin and company, and the London Lithographing company will hold their annual picnic at Port Stanley tomorrow. Accompanied by a band, they will travel to the lakeside via special Pere Marquette train and an extensive program has been arranged for the afternoon and evening.

Candidates Initiated.—At the regular meeting of Westminster Lodge, 404, A.O.U.W., a large number of candidates were given the Workmen degree by Bro. Joseph Stephens, assisted by Bro. Hutton, of London Lodge, and officers of Westminster, Bros. E. Morris and Lewis were presented with a gold watch and ring, respectively. Westminster Lodge has doubled its membership the past two months.

Looking for Forgers.—Detective Dierlam, of the Westburne division, Agency, Chicago, and a former Stratford resident, was in London yesterday with a view to apprehending three men wanted for defrauding the first National Bank of Chicago by means of forged checks. The men were thought to be in this city and Detective Dierlam learned that they had been seen in Springbank Park on Wednesday. One of the checks netted them \$4,500.

City Official Objects to Picayune Interference on Department's Routine Work.

BOARD READS ULTIMATUM

Letter to Foremen Emphasizes Source From Which Discipline Will Emanate.

City Engineer W. N. Ashplant today furnished the board of control with a copy of the letter he sent to all ward foremen. While no names are mentioned, he instructs the foremen in substance to pay no attention to outside influences in the performance of their duties. It is understood that the order applies to aldermen and controllers who have interfered with certain public works jobs over the engineer's head.

The letter was furnished to the board as a result of the story in The Advertiser a few days ago calling attention to the resentment of the city engineer over the persistence of certain city officials to show him how to run his department. Mr. Ashplant explained that the foremen were doing good work, and the letter was to impress upon them that the head of the department reserved the right to enforce discipline, which is now so necessary, to complete the big jobs under construction.

The members made no comment on the letter, which was read by the clerk and filed. Those close to Mr. Ashplant say that his office has recently been deluged with many picayune complaints originating with certain officials, whom he describes as "a blooming lot of wasps," whose conduct is well calculated to "make a chap real savage."

The sentiment on the board is to let Mr. Ashplant have his own way in working out the problems for which he alone is responsible.
