Returned soldiers were promi-ent in the offerings which were re-eived at the church on a Monday. The Brownsyille story is being used The Brownsville story is being used all over Canada in anticipation of the February 9-14 drive of the churches. Methodism, with 400,000 members, is counted on for an average of \$10 per person. Ontarlo's quota is \$2.800,000. The Toronto conference has been assigned \$1.100,000, and Hamilton \$600,000. Hamilton has the inspiration of a minister whose average salary for 25 years has been \$800 and who is giving \$300 of his present \$1,200 annual salary. One Brantford layman, according to the Christian Guardian, has had \$5,000 ready for the Methodist enterprise for the past three months.


