### DOHERTY, PERLEY AND FOSTER MAY GO TO CONFERENCE

Meighen Has Made Selection, But Names Are With-

OTTAWR, Aug. 16.—Canadian Press.—At the conclusion of a lengthy conference with Sir George Foster, minister of trade and commerce, Premier Meighen stated this afternoon that a decision as to who shall represent Canada at the forthcoming meetings of the assembly of the League of Nations in Geneva next month had been arrived at. The prime minister declined, however, to state the names of Canada's representatives, saying that they must pass through cabinet council in the form of an order-in-council before an announcement could be made.

It is practically certain that Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, will be one of Canada's representatives, and it is considered likely that Sir George Perley, Canadian high commissioner in London, will be the other. Sir George Foster, who was one of Canada's representatives at the last meeting of the league, has been mentioned as the likely choice again this year, but it is thought that the vexed political situation, and the possibility of a general election in the near future, will necessitate his staying in Canada. It is probable that Canada's delegates will leave within a week.
