

WILL ENTER APPEAL IN CASE OF CONVICTION

WOODSTOCK, Aug. 16.—A knotty problem came up in police court today when a driver of one of the Ontario department of highways cars was called to court for exceeding the speed limit. S. G. McKay for the defendant claimed that the owners of the cars were responsible, and that the department of highways could not be cited to court on the charge. The magistrate held over his decision, but Mr. McKay stated that if a conviction was registered it would certainly be appealed.

EXCHANGE COST CITY PREMIUM OF \$266,435

TORONTO, Aug. 16.—City Finance Commissioner Ross, in a report issued today, shows that in the payment of the \$3,428,712 of bonds in England and the United States the city had to pay a premium of New York exchange of \$266,435, and paid a discount of sterling exchange of \$239,279, the net amount

paid as a premium being \$27,157. The amount retired in New York was \$1,916,124, and in London \$1,512,587.

LAWYER IS SENTENCED.

OTTAWA, Aug. 16.—Alfred E. Lusier, former prominent lawyer, of 30 years standing in the capital, was sentenced to five years in the Kingston penitentiary by Judge J. H. Scott of Perth, at the court house today, after Lusier had pleaded guilty to two charges of theft involving about \$5,000.

GEDDES HEAD OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCES

All Possible Reductions To Be Made in National Expenditures.

LONDON, Aug. 16.—(Canadian Press Cable.)—In the House of Commons today Sir Robert Geddes, president of the board of trade, announced the formation of a committee to advise the treasury respecting national finances. The committee to consist of Sir Eric Geddes, chairman; Lord Farrington, Lord Inchcape, Sir Joseph Patten, Macdonald and Sir Guy Granet. The committee, said Sir Robert, would deliberate on the treasury report to the chancellor of the exchequer and be charged with the duty of making recommendations for effecting forthwith all possible reductions in national expenditure on supply, and to the treasury for the prospective conditions of the revenue. Questions of policy would remain the exclusive consideration of the cabinet, it was announced, but it would be open to the committee to deal with questions of policy. The treasury organization would be employed as in the ordinary course for the purpose of committee work and some other member of the civil service would be seconded for the work with it. The committee, said Sir Robert, would be provided with all information requisite to perform its duty, and the question of publishing its report would remain for consideration.

TRAIN LOAD OF EXPORT CATTLE LEAVING TODAY

Picked Animals From the District Are Going To England.

ILBERTON, Aug. 16.—A trainload of export cattle was shipped on the L. H. and B. today. Colwell & Snell of Exeter have charge, and several of the Lobo cattle loaded. A. D. Campbell, G. E. Sinker and A. M. McInroy are going over with 145 head. The train will go via Stratford from London, and in all 740 head will make up the load which will be shipped from Montreal on Saturday on the boat Welschman. If this shipment proves satisfactory it will be followed by more later. The pastures have been good, and this is unusually early for finished cattle, but these are picked from many herds of the best early steers. September and October are usually the months for shipping, but very heavy crops of millet are now being cut, and the second crop of alfalfa is good. Some good fields of red clover for hay have been seen, and judging from the bloom the crop of seed may be better than last season. The apple crop is reported very light and probably very few will be shipped from this district, as all may be needed for local use. The large general store here owned by the late H. McRae has been sold to Capt. Carter of London, who will probably have possession shortly. The gravel trucks and gangs with power loading shovel have arrived at the Coldstream gravel pit, and are now hauling gravel to the county road, town line, between Carleton Place and Adelaide. This road was graded last season, but not finished, and will make a short cut to Stratford when completed. The motor trucks are making good time on the haul, and save much labor for men and horses, although somewhat costly. Peter Mitchell has charge of the power loading shovel.

DOHERTY, PERLEY AND FOSTER MAY GO TO CONFERENCE

Meighen Has Made Selection, But Names Are Withheld.

OTTAWA, Aug. 16.—(Canadian Press.)—At the conclusion of a lengthy conference with Sir George Foster, minister of trade and commerce, Premier Meighen stated this afternoon that a decision as to who shall represent Canada at the forthcoming meetings of the assembly of the League of Nations in Geneva next month had been arrived at. The prime minister declined, however, to state the names of Canada's representatives, saying that they must pass through cabinet council in the form of an order-in-council before an announcement could be made. It is practically certain that Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, will be one of Canada's representatives, and it is considered likely that Sir George Perley, Canadian high commissioner in London, will be the other. Sir George Foster, who was one of Canada's representatives at the last meeting of the league, has been mentioned as the likely choice again this year, but it is thought that the vexed political situation, and the possibility of a general election in the near future, will necessitate his staying in Canada. It is probable that Canada's delegates will leave within a week.

FARMERS FINED WHEN WATER IS FOUND IN MILK

Charges Were Laid Under Instructions of District Inspector.

(Special to The Advertiser.) SIMCOE, Aug. 16.—Six farmers of Middleton Township paid fines totaling \$200 on fifteen charges of adulterating milk supplied to the Drimilk Company on August 6, 9 and 10, in Courtland police court last night. County Magistrate R. E. Gunton presided, and Crown Attorney W. E. Kelly, K.C., prosecuted.

Hemin Vandekamer was fined \$20 on two charges and \$15 costs. J. Bentley paid \$40 on three charges and \$20 costs. G. A. Ostrander paid \$20 on three charges and \$20 costs; G. Hillis, \$20 on two charges and \$20 costs, and William Schooley, \$40 on two charges and \$20 costs. Half of the amount of the fines goes to the informant and the remainder to the milk factory, under the Dominion statutes.

Information was laid by Dairy Inspectors Robert Cudahy and Robert Green, acting under instructions of District Inspector Frank Hearn of London. At the Drimilk factory the inspectors made no less than 370 tests of customers' milk and found only the six defendants' milk under \$1 per cent specific gravity.

At the trial the inspectors stated they tested defendants' milk both at the milk factory and the herd. There was an appreciable difference. All pleaded not guilty to the charge. One stated the cans might have sunk when put in the water to cool. "It might have floated or tipped or sunk, don't know," he said. Schooley and Ostrander said their wives must have left the milk water in the cans.

BROKE NECK IN FALL FROM MOW

Thomas Gowdy of Howick Tp., Killed While Unloading Grain.

(Special to The Advertiser.) WILKHAM, Aug. 16.—Thomas Gowdy, one of the best-known farmers of Howick Township, was instantly killed last evening while unloading grain at the farm of W. Miller. As he was tipping the load he fell from the mow headfirst, a distance of 20 feet, and broke his neck. The body was found by Miller. Gowdy was 65 years old. His wife died two years ago.

ESSEX FARMERS WILL VISIT HERE FRIDAY

Party Motoring To Chippewa Canal—Inspecting Farms En Route.

DUTTON, Aug. 15.—A party of Essex farmers, some 55 in number, who are on their way by automobile to the Chippewa Canal project, stopped over here this afternoon and were guests at the celebration at the Memorial Athletic Park, formally opened today. The tourists are all members of the farmers' branch of the Essex Board of Trade, and are inspecting stock farms along their route. While in this district this afternoon they were interested visitors to the McNeil farm. They are scheduled for a stop-over in London on Friday on their return trip to Windsor.

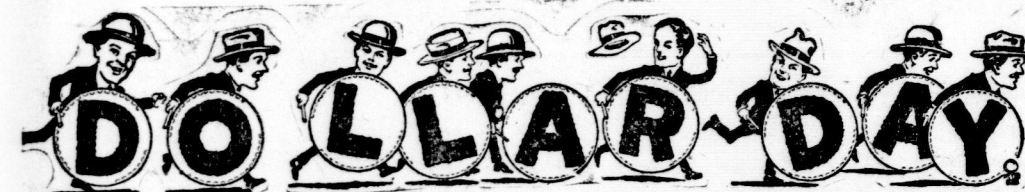
