

MAYOR OPENS LONDON'S NEW HYDRO STATION

J. Cameron Wilson Performs Official Ceremony at Cabell Street Depot.

BUILT BY LOCAL STAFF

Provides 25,000 Additional Horsepower to Existing Electric Supply.

Marking the turning of the corner to even greater electrical achievements in London the new hydro-electric sub-station, Cabell street and Kitchener avenue, was formally opened Saturday afternoon when J. Cameron Wilson, mayor of London, and Jared Vining, chairman of the public utilities commission, closed the switches that diverted into electrical energy 25,000 horsepower designed to adequately supply London's wants for years to come.

Chippewa, as the new East London station has been appropriately named, will be the controlling center for the entire city and has been declared by unquestionable electrical authorities to be the finest example of modern installation and skilled workmanship on the continent. The local commission takes unusual pride in the fact that all work has been accomplished by the local staff and special commendation is directed at J. W. Peart.

Meeting at the central station, Horton street at 2:30 p. m. Saturday, the public utilities commissioners, accompanied by E. V. Buchanan, general manager, A. O. Hunt, assistant general manager, Engineer J. W. Peart, Oliver Ellwood, secretary, W. J. Jackson and R. W. Swayze inspected that plant, expressing every satisfaction with conditions and laying special emphasis upon the cleanliness and general orderliness of the department.

Officials Banquet.
Second only in importance in the events of the day was the gathering for dinner in the evening of the various heads of the utilities department, i.e. commissioners and other officials connected with the city's waterworks and electrical branches when the 1921 reports were submitted and received with unstinted enthusiasm.

In his characteristic "after-dinner" manner Jared Vining, the popular choice of the commission as chairman in 1921 presided, and the success of the evening's entertainment was due in no small measure to his efforts, despite the fact that toward the close of the proceedings he "called" the press representatives to voice their sentiments on the bigger issues of the day.

Owing to the unfortunate illness of E. B. Graham, park superintendent, Arthur Carty was selected to read the annual report of the activities and expenditures of that branch of the work, chairman Vining finding occasion to comment upon the invaluable services of Superintendent Graham. "There is no more efficient official of the city than Mr. Graham," declared Commissioner Vining.

Mel Brock Attends.
Returning, he did from Ridley College, St. Catharines, to deliver his report, Mel Brock reviewed his work as director of playgrounds during the summer of 1921, and incidentally lauded the personnel of the utilities staff.

Introduced by Chairman Vining as one of the "landmarks" of the waterworks department, O. E. Ellwood, secretary, presented the annual report of his department.

"If Mr. Ellwood were not here," commented Commissioner Vining, "we should hardly know that we were actually meeting."

Secretary Ellwood's report, summarized as follows: Electrical department total receipts, \$989,677.93; waterworks department total receipts, \$253,893.33; parks department sundry receipts to city treasurer, \$5,138.11; playground department receipts to city treasurer, \$3,621.04, making a total of \$1,253,330.41.

A summary of the debentures is as follows: Electrical departments, checks issued, \$2,569 for \$1,094,826.50; waterworks department, checks issued, \$95 for \$356,795.18; parks department, checks issued, \$74 for \$37,548.24; playgrounds department, checks issued, \$34 for \$26,806.88, making a total of \$1,515,986.89.

A. O. Hunt, Manager Buchanan's "right hand man," as he was appropriately termed by the chairman, submitted a very satisfactory report on new business.

Equally encouraging was the report rendered on the stock resources by John Middlebrook.

Mr. Blay Presents Report.
When called upon, C. W. Blay, former sales manager of the city hydro snop, to deliver his report for the past year, Chairman Vining pointed out that despite severe criticism he felt that the continued success of that department, especially in 1921, certainly justified the end. He lauded in no feeble manner the efforts of Mr. Blay as manager of that department, and pointed out that "what was hydro's loss was the Advertiser's gain." Mr. Blay is now

The "man behind the gun," the man who directs the wiring through the year, W. J. Jackson, delivered a very satisfactory report, emphasizing the slogan of his department, "service to the public is our aim and service as cost."

As the chairman remarked, the various departments are so dovetailed into each other it is difficult to determine just who is the "man behind the gun," but if C. W. Alfred, in charge of the line department, fall off a sixty-foot pole "there would certainly be some delay." Mr. Alfred's report was likewise excellent and satisfactory.

According to Commissioner Vining, it is S. J. Dawson's duty to see that events proceed smoothly as scheduled at the main station and the sub-stations. Needless to say his reports on the operating departments measured up to expectations.

20 Years With Waterworks.
Springbank is where London first received their fresh water supply and there are many citizens today who yet believe that such is the only source. The man chiefly responsible for this is R. McCormick, another "landmark" with London's waterworks department. Submitting a remarkably satisfactory report, Mr. McCormick pointed out that he was proud to record 20 years continuous service with the city.

Chairman Vining replied that the commissioners were equally proud that Mr. McCormick was connected for so many years with the city and hoped that 20 years hence would still see him in harness.

"The commission and the city is indeed fortunate," said the chairman, in having as engineer J. W. Peart, an employee with splendid ability, high attainments in his profession coupled with a splendid overseas record." As to be anticipated Mr. Peart's report was highly satisfactory.

"What Mr. Alfred is in the electrical department," commented Commissioner Vining, "is Tom Hodgkinson in the waterworks department." The latter described as another "landmark" in the city's service delivered a report that was unequalled by any.

"But whenever Mr. Buchanan has anything to be done in the building line, even if it's decorating a table," Mr. Vining, "he calls in R. W. Swayze." The latter's report was received with like enthusiasm.

Pays Tribute to Buchanan.
Introducing Manager E. V. Buchanan, Commissioner Vining commented "Manager Buchanan has done his work in a competent and satisfactory manner. He has been his work appreciated before it will hurt him to hear it again. The more fact that such a harmonious attitude prevails between himself and the various employees is but a great tribute to himself."

Before delivering his report Manager Buchanan took the opportunity of introducing his "right hand man," "city manager," "Jimmie" Bell. The latter acknowledged the "challenge" and while refraining from offering compromising comment surveyed the gathering in a manner to denote that he was willing to take on all comers.

Manager Buchanan dwelt briefly upon the gratifying reports that had been submitted and spoke of greater expectations for the future augmented by the new station in East London—the commissioners as well as the staff and challenged comparison of the latter with that of any private corporation.

That the mayors who sat with the commissioners from time to time merely basked in the glory of the latter was the belief of Mayor Cameron Wilson. They had little to do with the efficiency of that department, he thought.

The mayor pointed out that while he had already been termed as "crazy on co-operation" he believed that such accounted in no small measure for the success of the local hydro department. He lauded the efforts of the latter branch of the city's service and expressed the hope that in the future the other bodies would co-operate with them in a similar undertaking.

Mayor Wilson voiced the opinion that Londoners should be congratulated that they had such a body as the hydro department, a form of public ownership that was being enacted as only public ownership should be, with profit.

MANY MOURN AS DR. CAMPBELL IS LAID AT REST

Funeral of Late Grand Sire of I. O. O. F. Was Solemn and Impressive.

BEAUTIFUL TRIBUTES

One of the largest and most impressive funerals that has taken place in London for many years was that of Dr. C. T. Campbell at St. Paul's Cathedral Sunday afternoon.

Dr. Campbell in his lifetime held many of the greater municipal offices of the city, was well known in fraternal circles, had been active as a worker and office-bearer in charitable and other organizations, and as a result hundreds of friends of the physician were present at the ceremonies.

The obsequies were under the auspices of the Independent Order of Oddfellows, and some four to five hundred members of that organization marched in the funeral procession, to pay their last respects to the man who had been, prior to his death, the oldest living grand sire of all Oddfellows, and the first Canadian to hold the office.

Many Officers Present.
Practically all of the Grand Lodge of Ontario officers were present, in addition to a number of representatives of the Sovereign Grand Lodge. Members of the subordinate lodges, who numbered some 400, while 75 Patriarchs Militant represented the cantons.

At 2:15 o'clock a private service was conducted at the Campbell residence by the Rev. D. Bright of St. Paul's. From there the funeral cortege proceeded to the church. Along the route of the procession, on Queen's avenue and Dundas street to the doors of the church, the cortege passed down a lane of the lodge members.

Three Carriages of Flowers.
Preceding the procession were three carriages bearing hundreds of floral tributes. Then, in advance, marched the ministers, the honorary pallbearers, the Patriarchs Militant, the city council and representatives of other civic bodies. Dr. Campbell was mayor of London in 1905, and at one time was chairman of the board of education.

The assembly officers and the officers of the Rebekah Chapters, representatives of the subordinate lodges, and the Grand Lodge officers completed the formation of the procession ahead of the coffin. An escort of Patriarchs Militant, with swords reversed, walked beside the cortege, and then came the active pallbearers.

At the doors of the cathedral the march halted, and the body was borne to the vestibule and into the church under an arch of swords held by the Patriarchs Militant.

Services in the Cathedral.
Services in the cathedral were conducted by Rev. Mr. Waller, principal of Huron College, and he was assisted by the Rev. Dr. Bright. At the conclusion of the service, the procession formed as before, and proceeded to Mount Pleasant Cemetery. The Oddfellows grave-side service was in charge of J. I. Hornbrook, P.G.B., P.G.R., of Toronto, acting in the capacity of noble grand. Mr. Hornbrook was assisted by W. S. Johnston, acting chaplain.

FINDS PROBLEMS ROOTED IN HOME

Rev. William Beattie Speaks On "Making Canadian Homes."

"A fierce light is beating upon the modern home. Scientific students of social problems state that nearly all our woes flow from defective homes. Our thorns and thistles are rooted in the family."

With this question from Charles Edward Jefferson, of New York, Rev. William Beattie of the First Presbyterian Church Sunday evening, launched into his sermon to mothers. The third of a series on the making of a Canadian home.

"If our tragedies are largely created by fathers and mothers who are unequal to their task, then there has surely arisen a great necessity for the expansion of our special teaching regarding our elementary laws of homemaking," stated the pastor.

"Through the ignorance of the laws of hygiene some invalid mothers pass on ailments to their children and know not why. The best use of foods, and goods, and God's own medicine, fresh air and sunshine, should be more diligently taught to the future motherhood of Canada."

"They should be taught to observe where their greatest influence lies; namely, not in the occasional and extraordinary effort but in the normal and habitual home life. The unconscious influence of what the mother does is what counts. What the mother does will reach down into the subconscious influence the mother has a place of marked pre-eminence because of the strength of the tie of natural affection."

"Put your arm under my head for that's what mother would do if she was here," said a dying soldier to a padre in France. The power of a mother's love will reach down into the brothel and slum, where all other human agencies are deaf, dumb and paralyzed; a mother's love can pursue and recall from the very gates of hell," concluded Rev. Beattie.

Gordon Knapp sang "Mother O Mine" in a special musical program. Miss Helen Holt, Miss Viola Williams, George Garow and Ed Crawford sang "Bar Mother's Way." The anthem was "Evening and Morn."

INGERSOLL PATENT CASE RESERVED

Much Technical Evidence Produced in Action Over Hearse.

Judgment was reserved by Chief Justice R. M. Meredith in the action brought by O. J. Mitchell of Ingersoll against A. B. Greer & Son of this city for the alleged infringement of a patent on a convertible hearse. The case, which commenced Friday afternoon, was concluded shortly after 6 o'clock Saturday evening.

The evidence submitted by both sides on Saturday was of a highly technical nature, expert witnesses from Toronto and Ottawa explaining the features of a dozen different patents on hearse bodies. In all, 31 exhibits were brought into court.

Took Legal Advice.
John Greer, for the defence, stated that the Greer firm had started to manufacture a similar type of article to that of Mr. Mitchell's in September of last year. He had gone to Toronto for advice in the matter, and had been told by two patent attorneys that he was not infringing on any patent or patents, and was advised to go ahead and manufacture his own article.

A. B. Greer gave evidence of a similar nature. James E. Mabey of Toronto, patent attorney, was star witness for the defence, and gave expert testimony in their favor.

Maurice A. Caron and Harold C. Shipman, patent attorneys of Ottawa, were called in reply to Mr. Mabey's testimony, the judge asking many questions.

To Consider Case.
"I'll consider this case," remarked Chief Justice Meredith, when arguments for the plaintiff by Arthur Ellis of Ottawa, and for the defence by T. G. Meredith, K.C., were heard. Court was then adjourned till Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock.

TOTTERS UNDER BURDEN OF DEBT

Bulgaria Groaning Under Load Which Will Take Several Generations To Liquidate.

SOFIA, Feb. 5.—Bulgaria is tottering under a burden of debt and indemnities which its financiers say will take several generations to liquidate. Under the peace treaty, the smallest of the belligerent nations is required to pay the Allies 2,225,000,000 francs (\$450,000,000).

Converted into Bulgarian francs (levas) at the current rate of exchange, this amounts to the staggering total of 67,000,000,000 levass. If to this sum is added the country's external and internal debt of 40,000,000,000 levass, a total of 107,000,000,000 levass is reached. (Nominally a Bulgarian leva would be worth 19 cents.)

Nobody knows, even the Bulgars themselves, how this colossal sum can be paid without wrecking the country and exhausting its resources. Under the Neuilly agreement, the Bulgarians were to pay their first installment of the \$450,000,000 indemnity in 1919, but up to the present they have lapsed in three installments.

Bulgarian government officials say they can make the state solvent and pay all its obligations if the powers will waive the indemnity payments for a reasonable length of time. They insist they can make little progress so long as the reparations commission holds the indemnity demand over their heads like Damocles' sword.

The country's total outstanding paper money amounts to 3,250,000 levass, only one-third of which is covered by gold reserve.

An encouraging feature in Bulgaria's otherwise apparently hopeless financial and economic situation is the steady increase in her exports, which for 1921 were in the proportion of 2 to 2½ to her imports.

With the object of stimulating exports and imports the government is planning the establishment of an international bank, composed in part of foreign capital, with branches or representatives throughout the world. An effort will be made to interest American bankers in the institution.
