"The whole of the Mississippi Valley states from the Great Lakes to the Gulf are a unit in their demand by the industrial east, who see, by the construction of the canal develop ment of 2,000,000 horsepower on the international section of the St. Lawrence River," said the engineer.

It had been reported that Montrea opposed the development of the canal but in that city only the electric power interests were antagonistic, the same interests which were in opposi tion to the project in the cities of the Atlantic seaboard in the United States, Mr. Grant asserted.
