Four Ambushed Thieves Hold Halifax Police At Bay

RACE WITH AMERICANS KEEN AS END APPROACHES

British Party Hops Off From Japan as U. S. Fliers Reach Paris.

TO LAND IN RUSSIA

Americans Could Not Use Soviet Territory Because of International Relations.

Tokio, July 14.—The British round-the-world aerial party, headed by A. Stuart MacLaren, landed on Toshima Island in the Kuriles, at 3:54 p.m. today, said a despatch from a Japanese destroyer on duty in Yokohama Island waters.

Kushiro, Island of Hokkaido, Japan, July 14.—A. Stuart MacLaren, the British aviator, with his two companions, on their way around the world, arrived here today from Minato, on Honshu, the main island of Japan.

The next stop of the British fliers is at Hitokappu anchorage on Yezo Island, one of the Kurile group. The United States round-the-world fliers stopped at Hitokappu, but instead of retracing their route eastward the MacLaren party will make a detour from Hitokappu to Attu Island, the westernmost of the Aleutians, where they again will pick up the trail of the United States fliers.

This detour will lead the Britishers to a small lake near the southern end of Paramushir Island, the most northerly but one of the Kuriles, instead of to the anchorage at the northern end of the island used by the United States fliers as a landing place. Thence they will fly to Petropavlovsk, on the western coast of the Kamchatka peninsula, to Behring Island, Copper Island and Attu. Except Attu, all these islands are Russian territory, and their use will shorten the overseas jump considerably as compared with the hop of 856 miles made by the United States fliers from Attu to Paramushir. Landings in Russia are possible for the British fliers, but the United States airmen could not come down on Russian territory because the United States has not recognized the soviet Russian government.

AMERICANS REACH PARIS.

Paris, July 14.—The United States round-the-world fliers arrived here at 4:46 o'clock this afternoon. They left Vienna early today, arrived at Strasbourg on the French frontier before noon and left there at 12:10 p.m. The French air service officials were advised in Strasbourg messages.

Tells Tragic Story of How Her Companions Were Drowned.

CANOE OVERTURNED

Sudden Squall Causes Happy Outing To End in Tragedy.

Breechin, Ont., July 14.—Lake Simcoe's treacherous waters have claimed the lives of two of the trio who ventured forth on an ill-fated sailing trip from Big Bay Point last Thursday afternoon.

The third member of the party, 16-year-old Marjorie Murchison of Barrie, is struggling back to consciousness here after a vigil of horror during which she claims to have seen both her companions—Wilbur Hoskins and Edgar Smith—go to their death, and after a grim 72-hour struggle for her own life.

MONTREAL CRASH TAKES LIFE TOLL

Three Are Killed as Automobile Is Struck by C.P.R. Train.

Shackman, Moses Taub and Jennie Shenroy, all of Montreal, were killed this morning, when an automobile in which they were riding was struck on a level crossing near Snowbridge by a Canadian Pacific train. Two others, a man in the car, Herman Gruver and Louis Goldner, also of Montreal, were badly injured.

According to a statement of C. P. R. officials, the driver of the car thought he could cross the tracks safely before the train reached the crossing.

PUSSY PAINTED GREEN AND OFFICER CALLED

LIBRARY'S CIRCULATION SHOWS BIG INCREASE

The total circulation of books at the public library for the month of June amounted to 21,258. Of these 4,296 were taken out by children. The circulation of the main library and all branches has increased over last year. The increase was greatest at the main branch, where the circulation was 12,193 books in June, children took out 2,563. In east branch, adults took out 2,211 and juveniles 892. The south branch lent 1,449 to adults and 363 to juveniles. The southeast branch had calls for 1,398 from adults and 478 from children.

MANY CHILDREN AWAITING ADOPTION AT LOCAL HOME

Twenty years ago today 10 little boys were at the Children's Shelter looking for foster parents. Today the Children's Aid Society was looking for homes for more boys, although not so many as were needed in 1904.
There is a bright, pretty little lad of three years over at the South London Shelter whom almost anyone would want in a home. Another is a boy of seven, active, healthy and normal in every way. The society is anxious to place these two fine children in good homes.

3,000 DEAD AS REBELS HOLD CITY IN BRAZIL

Luxurious Hotel Esplanade Is Turned Into Hospital for Wounded.

MORE TROOPS ARRIVE

Refugees Say 600 Federal Troops Were Cut to Pieces.

Santos, Brazil, July 13.—Fighting in the city of Sao Paulo, seat of the Brazilian republic, has been of the most desperate character during the past few days, according to two employees of a United States consular who arrived here today after a perilous journey afoot from the beleaguered metropolis. They estimated that the dead among troops and civilians will reach 3,000.

The luxurious Hotel Esplanade at Sao Paulo has been turned into a hospital, and is said to be crowded with the wounded. Shells from the besieging federal forces have been falling in the city. Most of the fighting, which has been taking place between here and Sao Paulo, is said to have been between small bands of rebels and federal troops.

Refugees confirm the report that 600 federal troops who started last week from Santos to aid in the relief of Sao Paulo, were cut to pieces by the insurgents.
Governor Da Campos, Sao Paulo state president, is understood to be here in Santos under federal protection.

REINFORCEMENTS ARRIVE.

Washington, July 14.—Considerable reinforcements of Brazilian government troops have arrived at Sao Paulo and are assisting in the operations against the rebels, according to official advices received at the Brazilian embassy today.

GUELPH LABORER IS ATTACKED FOR MONEY

Three Waylay Him on Way Home and Take \$5. Threatening His Life.

Guelph, July 14.—Late Saturday night, while Mr. Theodore Goetz, a farm laborer, was returning home, three negroes attacked him and demanded his money or his life. They got off cheaply and thinks the holdup men seemed desperate enough to carry out their threat of taking his life. The police are looking over the colored population of the city, but owing to the meagre descriptions obtained it is a difficult job.

USE OF AMERICAN STAMPS DOUBLES COST OF LETTER

American tourists who come to Canada post a lot of mail to their friends at home in the United States. Many of the letters have posed carry United States stamps. This calls for double the charge for postage and has to be paid by the person who receives the letter.
By posting a letter to the United States the cost amounts to 8 cents instead of three. The American visitor places a United States two-cent stamp on the letter, which, of course, will not carry the letter. The postal authorities here forward it, but a charge of double our rate of three cents is made to the recipient of the letter. The double charge is added to help pay for the added trouble involved.

MOTHER AND TWO CHILDREN INJURED IN AUTO CRASH

Mrs. A. J. Brown and her two children of Tibury received several cuts about the head as the result of a collision between the car in which they were riding with Mr. Brown, colliding with a machine driven by Mrs. Keith Black of Ekfrid, the Longwoods road, near the 18th concession of Ekfrid, late yesterday afternoon.
The two autos crashed head-on at a curve in the road, and both were completely wrecked. Mr. Brown and Mrs. Black were uninjured.

WOULD PREVENT VISIT TO BRITAIN

Student Admits Shooting the Egyptian Premier To Balk Negotiations.

Cairo, Egypt, July 14.—Zaid Zagloul Pasha, the prime minister, who was shot and wounded Saturday by Abdel Khadir, a fanatic nationalist, is reported to be recovering rapidly and is expected to leave the hospital in a few days. Abdel Khadir admits that he shot the prime minister to prevent him from going to negotiate with Great Britain.
The national agitator Sheikh Shawish, was arrested today in connection with the attempt on the premier's life. The police are making a further round-up in extreme nationalist quarters.

DAVIS WILL OPEN CAMPAIGN AT HOUSE OF HIS BOYHOOD

To Be Notified Officially of Nomination at Clarksburg.

AT HOME OF SISTER

Supporters Expect To Win Votes of Western Agricultural States.

New York, July 14.—The ceremony of officially notifying John W. Davis of his nomination for the presidency by the Democratic party will take place at Clarksburg, W. Va., it was learned today. Formal announcement of the arrangements for the event, which probably will take place within two weeks, is expected within the next few days.

Mr. Davis will deliver the address of acceptance, which will signalize the opening of the Democratic campaign, at the house where he lived as a boy, and in the town that has been the residence of his family for a century. The house is now occupied by a sister of the nominee.
Although Mr. Davis has spent the last eleven years in Washington, London and New York, he was his friends and neighbors in Clarksburg who, under the leadership of Clem Shaver, one of three under consideration for campaign manager, initiated and maintained the pre-convention campaign for Mr. Davis nomination. Mr. Davis considered appropriate that he should open his battle for election in West Virginia.

HOPES TO WIN WEST.

Locust Valley, N. Y., July 14.—John W. Davis hopes of carrying the western agricultural states have increased as a result of week-end conferences with Senator Walsh of Montana and Carl Vrooman of Bloomington, Ill., here.
Both the western leaders recommended that the candidate devote a large part of his time to a speaking tour of their sections, and Mr. Davis asserted he intended to do so.

REFUSES TO GRANT HOME BANK APPEAL

Privy Council's Decision May Not Mean No Jury Trial.

MATTER UNSETTLED

Will Give No Definite Statement Until Return of D. L. McCarthy.

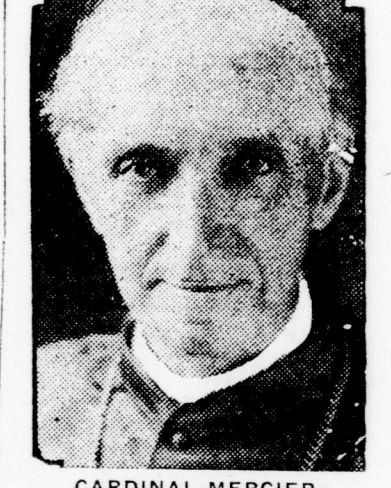

London, July 14.—The appeal of the Attorney-General of Ontario Hon. W. F. Nickle, to the privy council, against the judgment of Justice Middleton of the Supreme Court of Ontario, granting a speedy trial to the accused directors of the defunct Home Bank of Canada on the charges of conspiracy laid against them under the bank act, has failed entirely. The judicial committee of the privy council gave judgment today dismissing the appeal.

Lord Cave said the original leave to appeal was based on two grounds: First, that the supreme court had no power to issue a mandamus to compel a county judge to try the respondents; also that the civil jurisdiction had been wrongly invoked, and second that that portion of the criminal code relating to speedy trials gave the defendants no right to elect for trial by a county judge. No question arose as to a violation of the principles of natural justice, and therefore leave to appeal on this matter alone would have been refused. Lord Cave said.

Their lordships of the judicial committee had now been in possession of the circumstances of the case as a whole. Lord Cave continued, and they had found that no serious question had arisen concerning the jurisdiction of the supreme court to grant a mandamus in such a case. The court was clothed by statute with all the powers formerly belonging to the Queen's Bench of Upper Canada, which had the power to grant a mandamus to an inferior court.

TRIAL NOT YET SETTLED.

REV. J. E. HUNTER DIES SUDDENLY

Secretary of London Methodist Conference Passes Away Today.

The death occurred suddenly this morning of Rev. J. E. Hunter, pastor of the Granton Methodist Church, and secretary of the London Methodist Conference. Mr. Hunter went to bed last night in what seemed to be perfect health. He had only been up a short while this morning when he was stricken and died before aid could be summoned. He had always been an industrious and diligent worker, and it is the belief of his friends that he worked himself to a point where he suffered a complete breakdown, and had not the strength to fight off death.

He was ordained in 1905 at the Listowel conference, and since that time has been president of the London Conference at the meeting in Windsor during the first week of June. This, coupled with his duties in the London Ensworth League, of which he was president, was thought to have brought too much work on him.

He is survived by his widow, Minnie, formerly Miss Minnie Robinson, daughter of Rev. J. W. Robinson, and two daughters. He is also survived by one brother, Rev. William Hunter, who is connected with the Methodist Church in Pennsylvania. He was coming to Canada on the first of August to spend the month with his brother at his cottage at Brantford.

The deceased was born in Morris Township, Huron County, and had all his early schooling there. He was a member of the church at Wednesday afternoon. The services will be conducted by Rev. H. J. Uren, president of the London Methodist Conference.

POLICE GUARD FLAG OVER FRENCH EMBASSY

The measure was a precautionary one, taken to prevent a repetition of the incident of three years ago on the French national holiday, when the Triplets were wrested from the staff by men who reached the embassy roof from adjacent buildings.
The French embassy here hoists its flag only on July 14.

POLICEMAN IS SHOT BY THIEVES IN HALIFAX

Party of Four Takes Ambush in Woods Outside City.

HOLDS FORCE AT BAY

Discovered Stealing Camping Outfit, Robbers Make For Cover.

Kennedy was shot from ambush as they ran off in the darkness, leaving their booty behind.
