### TEACHERS FEEL PLAN WOULD END **ALL UNIT SCHEME**

Question Will Be Left For the Aldermen To Reach Decision.

ACTION NEXT YEAR

Realizing the futility of making a sectional question of the high school situation, residents of South London have abandoned plans to petition the council protesting against the decision of the board of education which named East London as the site for the new high school.

Rather than create bad feeling and possibly influence the council to throw out the board's recommendation, South London citizens have de cided not to send a delegation to the aldermen Wednesday night, when the trustees' proposal will either be re-jected or ratified. Although they still consider South London the logical location for a new collegiate, they feel that any action on behalf of South London residents will only make the high school problem mor

An impromptu meeting of the South London Teachers' Association was held last evening. To a it was determined to stand behood, the trustees in their selection of . st London as the collegiate site.

"Of course, we would rather have the school in South London," a mem-ber of the association said, "but we feel that if we do anything we might spoil East London's chances and no

Another stated that if East London were provided with a new collegiate the chances of South London for a new school in a year or so would be very good. If a protest were filed, East London might not get a school at all, and South London youngsters would be no better off than formerly than formerly

"If we saw any hope of getting the school in this section of the city we would take action," he said, "But as things stand, I don't think there much chance just now. We will i orse the proposal of the trustees.

According to the list of requirements prepared by Dr. Voaden, following a tour of these schools last week, it will cost \$26,719 for equipment for the St. Thomas school.
