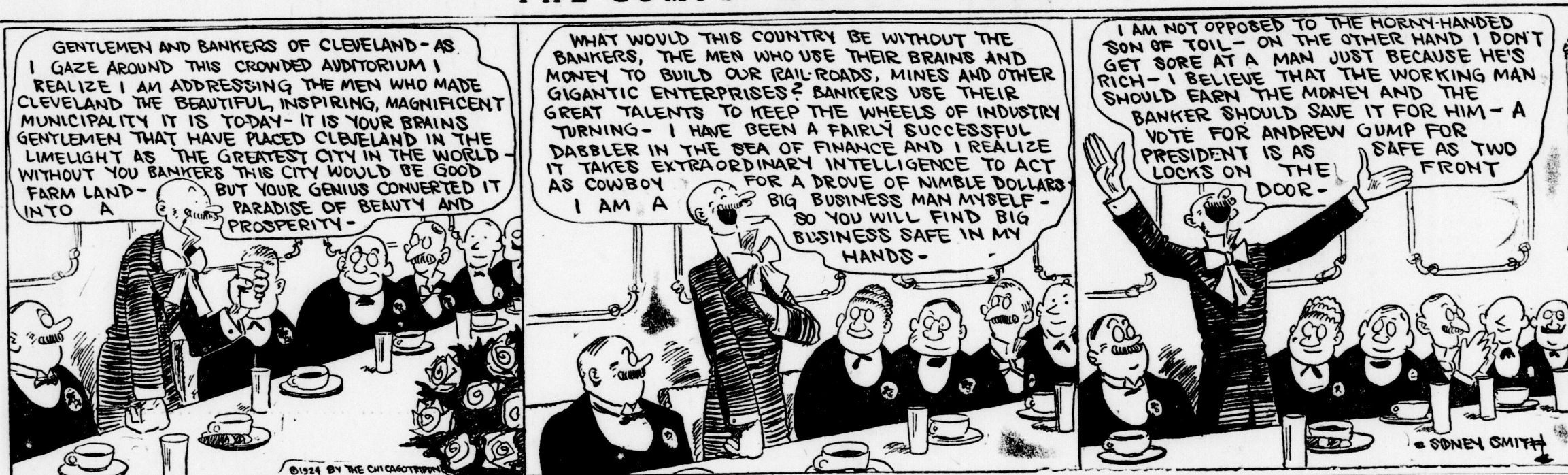

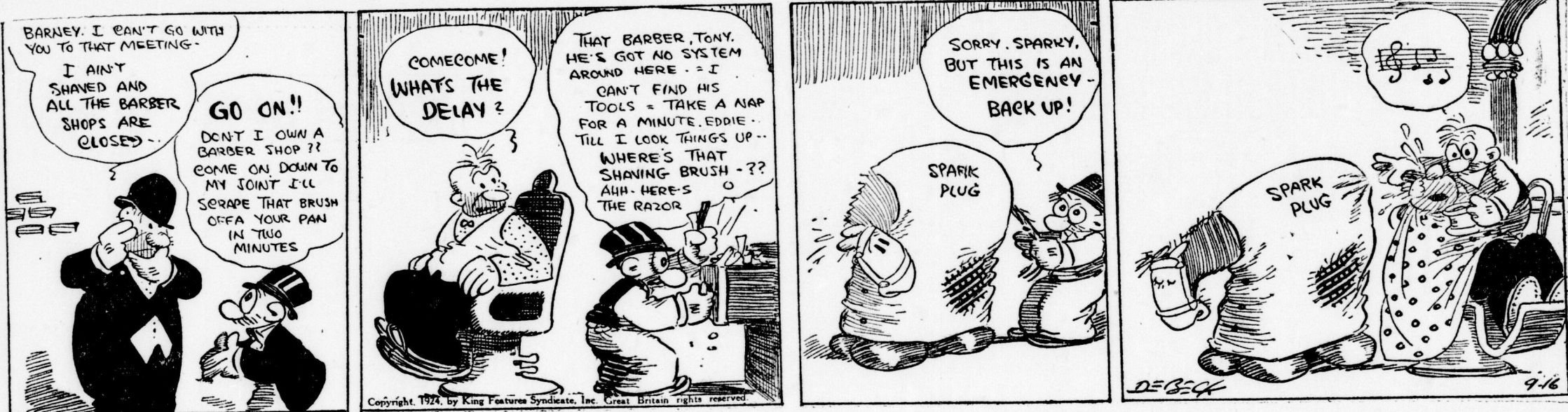

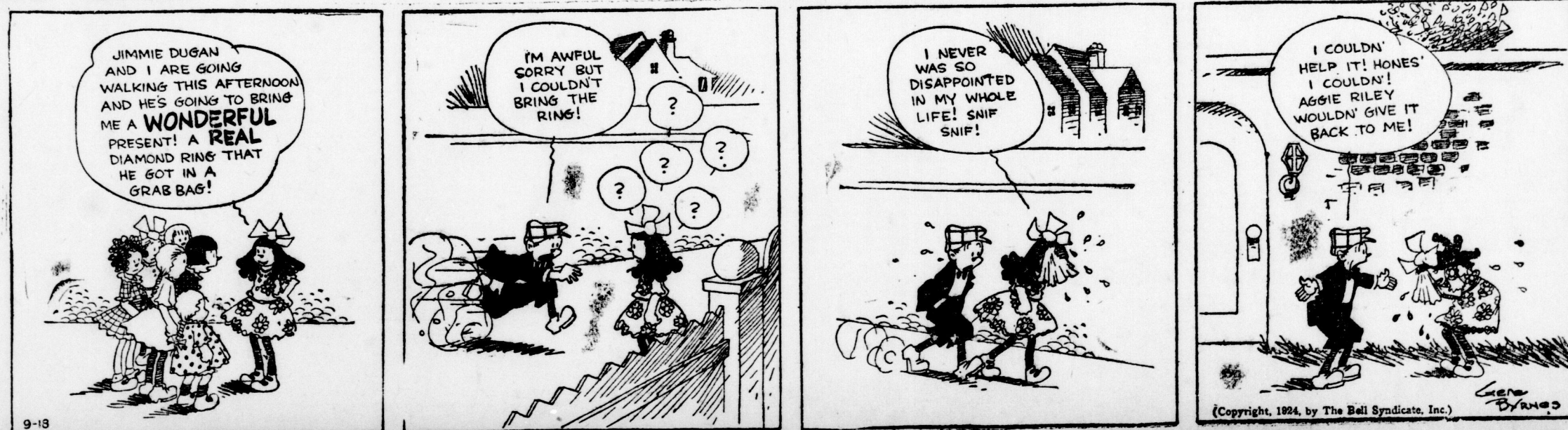

Helen turned a smiling face as she said: "You can't fool me. I know that's a radio station."

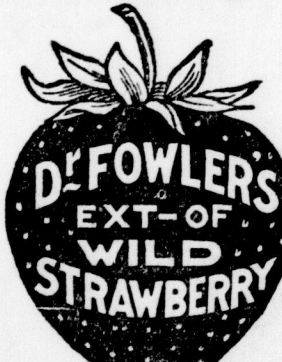
