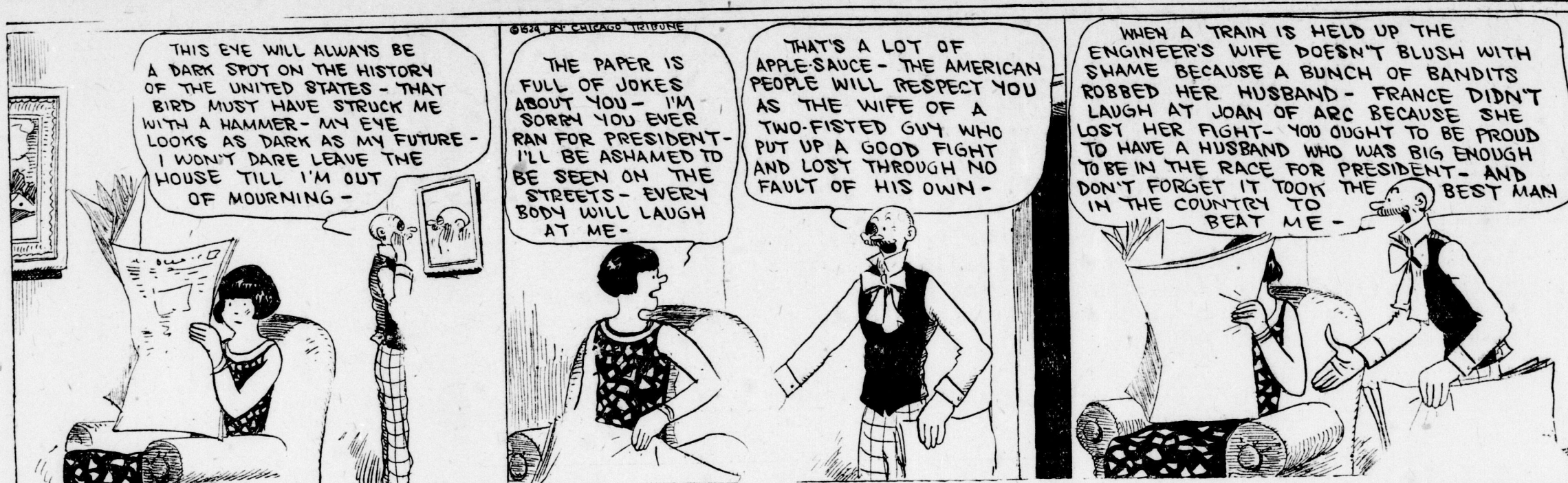

SCHOOLS WILL BE CLOSED

THREE DAYS EARLIER

The public schools, collegiate institutes and technical high school will close for the Christmas vacation on Friday, Dec. 19, instead of Monday, Dec. 22.

This decision was made by the board of education yesterday upon recommendation of Inspector V. K. Greer, Principal E. A. Miller, of the collegiate institute, and Principal H. B. Beal, of the technical high school.

It was pointed out that while Monday was the day the schools should close, in accordance with the department of education regulations, that it would not be worth while to bring the pupils and students back for only one day and that the first in the week.

Several businessmen, including A. E. Silverwood, David Ross, Max Lerner, R. W. Wade, Mayor Wenize, E. R. Dennis, Harry Wray, J. W. Wray, S. R. Drake, B. E. Fountain, P. O. Stewart, C. H. Brown and J. F. Jenkins came together to discuss solutions for the advancement of the colored race.

It was decided to put the Dawn of Tomorrow, the colored weekly paper, on a paying basis so that the paper could take up the cause of the colored race.
