Shipping Men Indignant at Dominion Government's Rescinding Order. Remarkable Volte Face in Respect to Yukon Coasting Law.

The secretary reported the recent action taken in respect to advising Ottawa regarding the P. R. West construction and the decision of the government to permit work to proceed at once.

In regard to fast trains the president reported that telegrams had been sent to Hon. Senator Trenchard, George Hanna, M. P., and Ralph Smith, M. P., thanking them for their efforts in respect to the fast train project.

Mr. Morley reported on the unfair treatment inflicted on the fishery men of the Fraser by the new laws in regard to traps and traps and traps.

Referring to the present prospects of the Conservative party, he said that they had for a long time been waiting for a chance to cheer for.

The Fruit Growers Association forwarded a copy of resolutions asking the Dominion government to remove the enforcement of the Bore Ponds Act.
