Clause 18 of the bill enacts that any time not less than three years after the grant of a patent any person interested may apply for the revocation of the patent on the ground that the patented article is manufactured exclusively or mainly outside the United Kingdom. The controller may revoke the patent unless the patentee proves that the patented article is manufactured or made in the United Kingdom, or "gives satisfactory reasons why the article is not so manufactured."

The Shoe and Leather Record believes this clause aimed at shoe manufacturers in America and patented, but not made, in Great Britain. The same paper criticizes clause 16, which says was avowedly inserted for the protection of the British shoe manufacturer against the use of his trade or industry any article or process of manufacture acquired by any person other than the person by whom the condition is imposed, or by his nominee, and any such condition inserted in any such contract shall be null and void.

PARLIAMENT'S WORK MAKES PROGRESS

Provincial Subsidies Act—Better Treatment of Postal Officials is Urged

Ottawa, April 18.—The department of marine and fisheries has decided to strictly enforce on and after June next the new provisions of the law requiring the master of every ship to report to the department the names of all persons on board. The penalty for carrying a seaman without a license is \$200. A complaint of Messrs. Lavergne and Tremblay, who are in charge of the printing of the insurance commission evidence in French was made by the House today by the chairman of that committee, Mr. Parnelle, and after some discussion it was decided that the evidence shall be printed in French as well as English.

The bill to amend the Post Office Act was passed after some discussion. Messrs. Borden and Bennett urged that the salaries of rural postmasters be increased, and Mr. Foster appealed for better treatment of all the officials of the post office department. Mr. Lemieux in reply said the whole question of civil service salaries would be taken up shortly. Provision would be made in the supplementary estimates for an extension of the free delivery system to cities of over 10,000 population.

DOMINION'S EXPENSES THIS YEAR ARE \$116,631,000

Supplementary Estimates to Amount of Nearly Eleven Millions

B. C. AND YUKON EXPENDITURES

Victoria Immigration Building—New House for Yukon Commissioners—Fraser River Improvements

Ottawa, April 19.—The total estimates for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1907, reach the astounding figure of \$116,631,077. The supplementary estimates, which came down tonight, amount to \$11,663,077, making, with the main estimates submitted early in the session, the grand total as given above.

Cost items include the following: Cranbrook, public buildings, \$7000; Darcy Island leper hospital, quarters for lepers, \$300; Nelson, public building improvements, including fittings, \$1,000; Quessell, public buildings, \$2,000; Vernon, public building, \$5,000; Victoria, immigration building, inclusive of site, \$25,000; Victoria, post office alteration, \$4,000; William Head, quarantine station, improvements to building and launch, additional amount, \$1,200; Yukon commissioner's residence, Dawson, \$25,000; Clayquot, wharf, \$2,000; Courtney, river improvements, to complete, \$1,500; Fraser river, ship channel improvement, \$14,000; Fraser river wharves, \$20,000; Fraser river protection work at Matsqui, local government contributing an equal amount, \$500; Kootenay river, removal of boulders from channel between Kootenay Landing and the international boundary, \$2,500; Pitt river, substitution of 200 foot truss for original 132 foot truss of draw span on C. P. R. bridge, inclusive of necessary works, \$55,000; Quatsino, wharf on north side of inlet, \$1,500; Salmon Arm, Shuswap lake, wharf, \$1,100; Ashcroft-Quessell section of Yukon main line, part repaving, \$5,800; Nanaimo-Comox line, part repaving of bridge beyond Quessell, \$2,000; Quessell-Barkerville line, to complete repairs, \$1,000; Salt Spring Island telegraph line, extension to Esquimalt, \$1,500; telegraphic communication between Vancouver and Denman, \$1,500; telegraphic communication between Beale line, improvements, \$1,500; Vernon-Kelowna, Penticton, line, \$1,000; Vernon-Princeton, line, \$1,000; Port Simpson branch, extension of line between Port Simpson and Port Rupert, \$3,000; branch line from Hazelton to Livingston creek, \$4,000; grant to local council for line in England territory, \$100,000; grant to the commissioner of Yukon to aid steamers making prospecting trip on rivers in Yukon which are not usually traveled, \$10,000; a further amount for salaries in connection with the Yukon, \$2,000; for Mrs. Kate Guillot, \$200; another amount for schools, \$5,500; further amount for hospitals, medical attendance and medicines, \$3,000; amount for Babine Indians, \$5,500; further amount for miscellaneous and unforeseen additional for monthly steam communication between Port Eslington and Port Simpson and the Queen Charlotte Island, \$5,500; monthly steam communication between Prince Rupert and Jedway, Queen Charlotte Islands, \$750.

Statutes are to be erected in Ottawa to Baldwin and to appoint to cost \$10,000 each. Forty additional railway clerks are to be appointed. The cost of additional stores taken over at Esquimalt and Halifax is \$250,000. A million and a half is expended on new rolling stock for the Intercolonial railway.

C. N. R. COMES SHORT

Government Operation of Prince Albert Branch Recommended

Winnipeg, April 18.—At a conference between the board of trade and government railway experts who have been sent here to report on the use of transportation and to suggest remedies, it was stated that these officials will recommend that the government operate the Prince Albert branch of the C. N. R. in the public interest, the company having shown that its equipment is absolutely inadequate for the freight business of the system.
