BY ARCTIC CLUB Decree Issued by President Zelaya Will Block Mails and Cargoes

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Late advices received today at the State Department show that martial law has been declared in Managua, the capital of Nicaragua, and that President Zelaya has decreed the Atlantic coast ports closed as ports of entry. It is also reported that the entire east coast of Nicaragua is in the possession of the revolutionists, and that the revolt has extended to the western part of the country. The closing of these Nicaraguan ports is proving an embarrassment to the steamship lines which have received goods for shipment there; and the State Department has also asked what courses should be pursued with respect to these shipments, and also with respect to mails destined to eastern ports as well as to interior points. 


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
