The St. John Times, commenting on the conference of business men and newspaper men in St. John, makes the following timely comment:—We are all, in a sense, groping toward the light. A new spirit has possessed the people of New Brunswick, but they are not quite sure whether it will lead them. Their faces are turned toward the morning, and not toward the sunset—to the east and not toward the west. Wherever men get together, whether in farmers' conventions, conferences of municipal representatives or boards of trade, the question uppermost is this: What can we say or do to develop greater confidence in the resources and advantages of New Brunswick, and more effective means of turning all of them to profit? Nor is the change of sentiment confined to material things. In many affecting moral and social conditions a new spirit has arisen. The whole outlook of the citizen of New Brunswick whether he is as yet fully conscious of it or not, has vastly improved. This conference will do great good. It is the beginning of a movement the significance of which is perhaps not realized at the moment. We in St. John are at present putting emphasis upon the growth that has taken place here in ten years. The men from Moncton, Fredericton, Sussex, Campbellton and other places could tell of similar growth. There has been progress all along the line. It is admitted that the rural communities need a new impulse, and that this is really the most important matter now commanding public attention, but the very fact that so much emphasis is laid upon it is the best guarantee that conditions will improve.

Campbellton is growing at a faster rate than any other town in New Brunswick, but it could grow faster. Why not help it along.

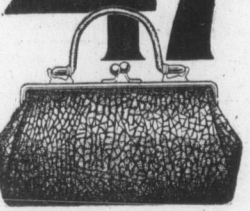
Do not hide your light under a bushel. If you have anything of interest in reference to your business or town let the papers have it.

Tenders will be received and considered for any or all of the items indicated above and numbered from 1 to 10, both inclusive.

Persons desiring to be notified that tenders will not be considered unless made on the printed forms supplied by the Commissioners, which may be had on application to the Chief Engineer at Ottawa, or to the District Engineer at St. Boniface, Man.

Each tender must be signed and sealed by all the parties to the tender, and witnessed and accompanied by an accepted cheque on a chartered bank of the Dominion of Canada payable to the order of the Commissioners of the Transcontinental Railway for a sum equal to ten per cent. (10 per cent) of the amount of the tender.

Any person whose tender is accepted shall within ten days after the acceptance of the tender, execute the contract with the Commissioners, the said cheque shall be forfeited to the Commissioners, as liquidated damages for such refusal or failure, and all contract rights acquired by the tenderer shall be null and void.

The cheques deposited by parties whose tenders are accepted will be deposited to the credit of the Receiver General of Canada as security for the due and faithful performance of the contract according to its terms.
