Hugh Hayvern Hanged at Montreal For the Mur-Swings-Ruining and Murdering a Young

past 8 o'clock this morning Hugh Hayvern expiated his crime of murdering William Salter, a fellow-convict in St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary on the 28th of May last, at the hands of the public executioner, and within the precincts of the common jail here. The prisoner had been constantly attended for some time past by Rev. Father down below.
