AN APPROACH IN THE COMMONS.

RUSSELL WAS PROTESTING AGAINST THE BEING COERCED. When some said, "What the Devil are you talking about?" And then the Row began--The Amendment to Repeal the First Clause of the Irish Bill Defeated.

LONDON, May 12.—The House of Commons, sitting as a committee of the whole on the Home Rule bill, to-day resumed the debate on the motion made yesterday by Mr. George Bartley, Conservative member for North Lillingdon, to strike out the first clause of the measure, a motion which practically means to reject the whole bill.

The debate was marked by several scenes of excitement, the most prominent of which occurred while Mr. T. W. Russell, who represented the south division of Tyrone, had the floor. "What the Devil are you talking about?" Mr. Russell, who, though a Liberal, is opposed to Home Rule for Ireland, was protesting against Ulster being coerced into acquiescing in the establishment of an Irish Parliament, when a voice was heard saying, "What the devil are you talking about?"

Mr. Russell at once stopped his protest and accused Mr. John A. MacDonnell, a well-known member who sits for South Down, with making the objectionable question. Mr. MacDonnell emphatically denied having asked the question, and insisted that Mr. Russell applied for accusing him of having done so.

Mr. MacDonnell, Conservative, declared that he had heard Mr. MacDonnell utter the words attributed to him by Mr. Russell. Mr. William Macartney, Conservative, who represents the south division of Antrim, said that it was Mr. Thomas Sexton, the well-known anti-Parliamentary, who had asked the question.

Mr. Sexton denied this statement and added that he had not uttered a word. A general squabble seemed imminent and Sir William Vernon Harcourt appealed to the House to preserve order.

On the troubled waters. The chairman then intervened, saying that order must be observed. He said that such remarks as the one just made were not only out of place but were also becoming frequent in the House. He then proposed that the House should adjourn for ten minutes.

TO RAISE ARMY BILL FUNDS. The German Government Now Proposes a Tobacco Monopoly. BERLIN, May 12.—The Emperor William has decided his intention to open in person the new Reichstag. The Government is now discussing the expediency of proposing a tobacco monopoly as a means of raising the money required by the Army bill.

STREWED ASHES OVER THE FLOWERS.

The Rev. Dr. Rainford Conducts An Unusual Funeral Ceremony Over the Ashes of a Cremated Body. NEW YORK, May 12.—An unusual kind of funeral service was performed yesterday afternoon in St. George's Church, East Sixties street, at the residence of the Rev. Dr. Rainford. It was over the ashes of a cremated body.

The ceremony drew a large crowd. The urn, 11 1/2 inches in diameter, was placed at the head of the middle aisle at the foot of the altar. The metal case containing the ashes was in a hand-drawn wooden cart covered with white satin. On two sides were photographs, one showing her in ordinary dress, the other in a military uniform.

DRUGHT IN ENGLAND. No Rain in the South of England for Eight Weeks—A Plague of Caterpillars.
