The Financial Outlook

The statement of Canadian char-

tered banks for the month of June, which has just been issued by the finance department, shows a considerable decrease in deposits on both savings and current accounts. As compared with the month of May there is a decrease of \$7,826,634 in savings deposits, which are nearly ten millions less than they were at the end of June a year ago. Deposits where he left forty years ago on demand, that is for current business, show a decrease of \$1,389,714 for the month, and are less than they were at the end of June, 1912.
